WHAT OF OUR OWN HOME TOWN

ONLY ONE KIND OF FAILURE

DECLINE OF SUPERSTITION

The last of the believers in which all who did not worship Mohammed were unbelievers and infidels, has deposed its caliph, the king of its church.
