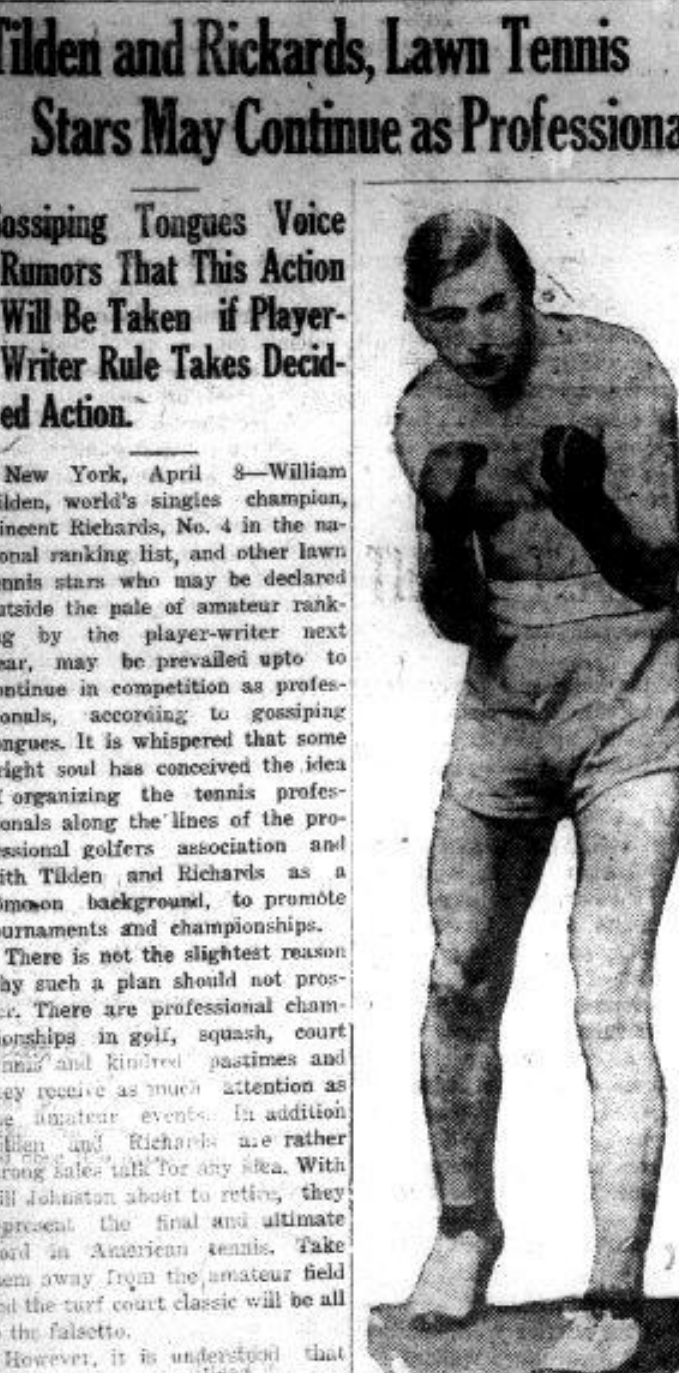

GENERAL DAWES REPARATION COMMITTEE PRESENTS REPORTS TO INTER-ALLIES

World's Greatest Program Concerning German Capital Estimated by Reparation Experts Quote Figures at \$1,687,500,000-Two-Fold.

(By Frank E. Mason)
Paris, April 9.—The world's greatest program for the financial restoration of a temporarily bankrupt nation—the German Reparations Commission today by the International Committee of Reparations Experts headed by General Charles Dawes, of Chicago.

The plan recommends the creation of a new bank of issue, capitalized at 400,000,000 gold marks (approximately \$100,000,000) to act as the Allies chief fiscal agent in Germany; an external loan to assist in the balancing of the budget and the restoration of confidence in Germany's financial and economic life; insurance of 2,000,000,000 gold marks per year by the German railways to be sold to the public; an elaborate and detailed plan for balancing the German budget so that Germany can resume reparations payments as soon as the transition period gets fully under way.

The committee proposed that the first external loan for Germany should be \$200,000,000 gold marks or approximately \$50,000,000. The money to be applied specifically to creating the bank of issue and stabilizing currency. None of it would be applied directly upon reparations payments. Proceeds of the loan would be deposited in the bank of issue. Indirectly part of the loan would be used to construct a bank in which will not be interrupted during the transition period.

The committee pointed out that the success of the whole plan depends upon three main factors:

German Capital Estimated by Reparation Experts Quote Figures at \$1,687,500,000-Two-Fold.

(By Frank E. Mason)
Paris, April 9.—German capital of all classes held abroad is officially estimated by the McKenna Committee of International Reparations experts at \$1,687,500,000. This total is purely an estimate and it is impossible to determine the actual sum. McKenna did not tender his report in person, but presented it through the American member of his committee, H. M. Robinson.

The report of this committee, transmitted today by Reginald McKenna, the chairman, to the International Reparations Commission, estimates the foreign currency in Germany at \$1,687,500,000. The report also estimates the real estate and securities owned in Germany by foreigners at approximately \$1,500,000,000 gold marks.
