PLAYGROUND A BOON
The public playground with its organized and supervised games has supplied that something which for so many years lacking from the American system of elementary education.

Before the inception of the community play idea millions of American children were left to roam the streets of their cities in the spring and in too many instances were allowed to run at large without restraint from home or school until the opening of the school sessions in the fall. Much of the discipline and knowledge inculcated into these youthful minds during eight or nine months of school instruction was irrevocably lost in the three or four months intervening between the school year and its resumption.

The American city is not known which has not at least one public playground. Most of the larger towns have provided free playground facilities and countless of the smallest communities have their playgrounds. Everywhere the idea has taken a nation of intelligent and healthful youth: The scientist of the mind and the body have long held that a sturdy body and a sound mind are the fruits of the co-ordination of work and play and that without such co-ordination during adolescence body and mind must suffer.

NEW HANDLE FOR SOCIALISTIC SCHEMES.
The Public Ownership League of America is working for the adoption of a National Public Superpower bill. The bill would create a national public power authority and would give it authority to construct and operate a nationwide system of superpower plants.

FARM ELECTRIFICATION.
Construction of superpower plants and establishment of larger power units by mergers are continuing as marked features of industrial development. Back of all this is widespread demand for electricity on farms.

APPRENTICE SYSTEM.
There has been some progress in the last 15 years in the class-room method of apprentice education. There has been a little progress in so-called vocational training in schools, but not enough to counteract labor unions minimizing apprentices.

WOULD MEAN SOUTHERN DEVELOPMENT.
That the South, particularly the people of small towns and rural communities in northern and eastern Mississippi, will benefit greatly, and industry will receive a new impetus, if the offer of the Southern power companies for Muscle Shoals is accepted, is generally predicted.

Statements With Gen. Dawes' Letter
Paris, April 9.—A unanimous agreement has been reached upon the details of the world's most far-reaching financial program—setting up reparations commission—setting up committee of experts of which Charles G. Dawes, of Chicago, is chairman.

The meeting here will take up for discussion that part of the bill which provides for the deepening of the Mississippi River channel from the Mississippi River to Kansas City. A proposal to improve the Mississippi National authorities on waterways development and improvement will also be discussed.

Improvement of rivers is being opposed by the railroads, it was pointed out, not so long ago. L. W. Baldwin, president of the Missouri Pacific system, declared that on an economic standpoint it was necessary to develop all methods of transportation in order to keep up with the development of the nation.

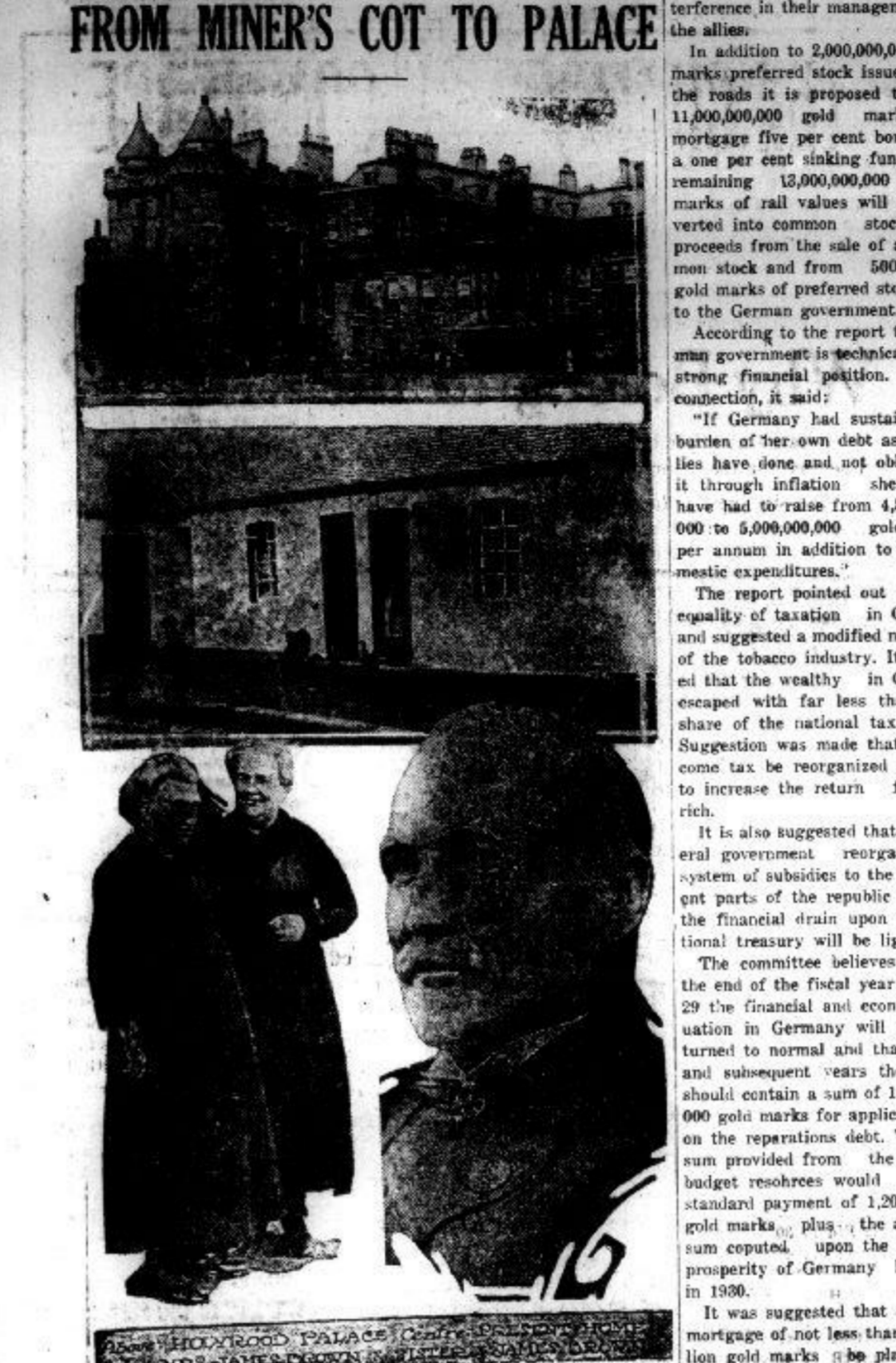

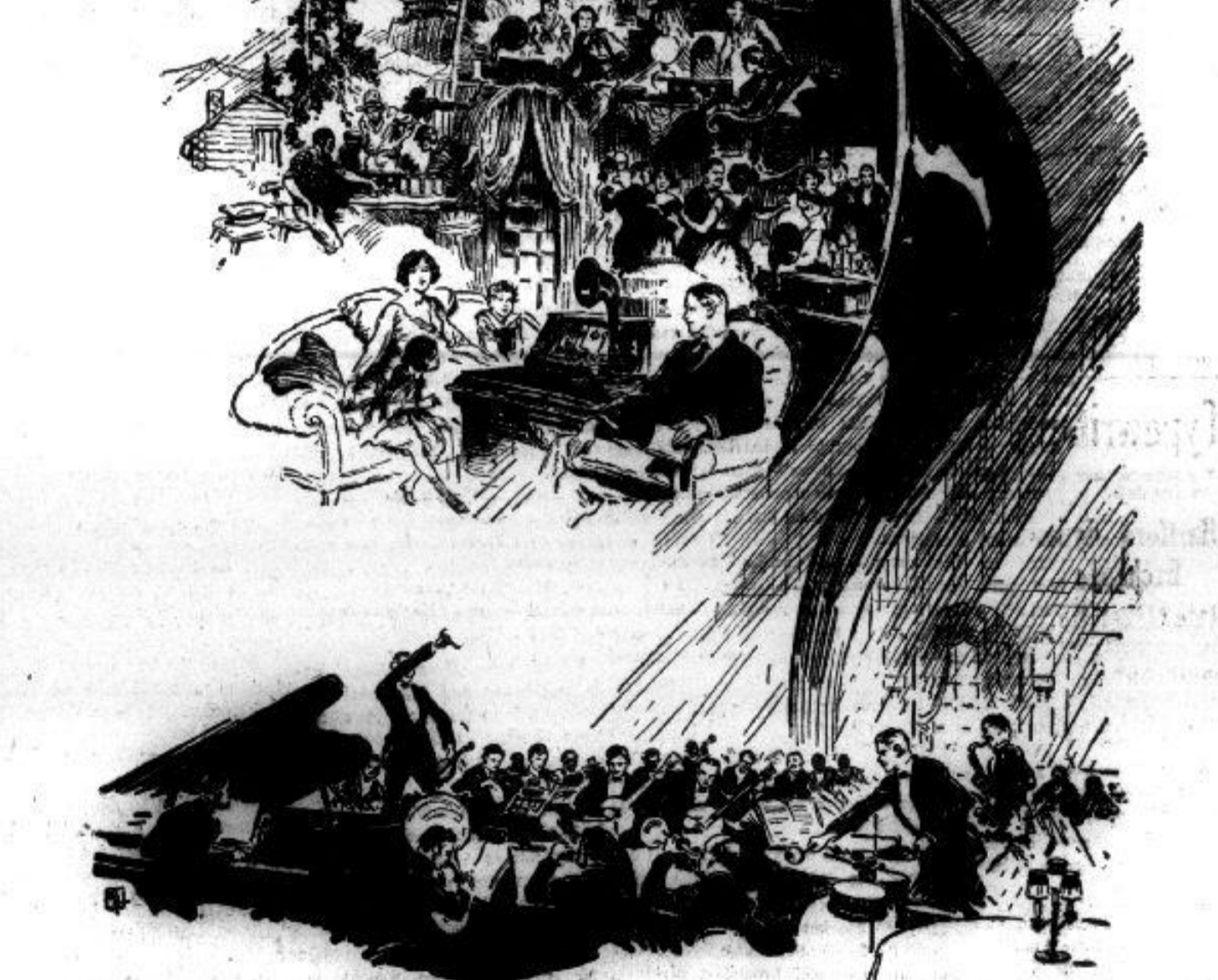

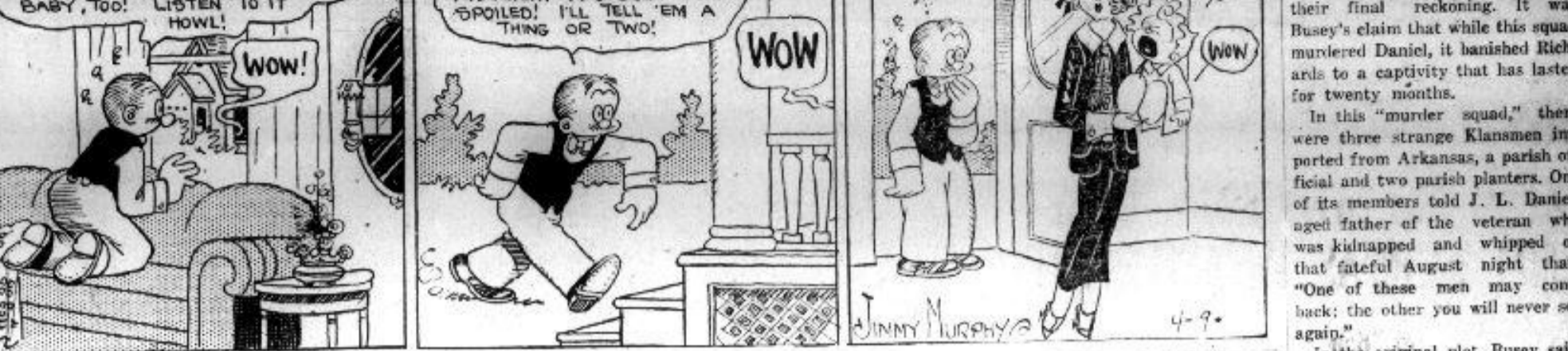
