Stamford, Conn., April 11.—Forty employees of the St. John Woodworking Co. went on strike here today to enforce their demand for an increase of \$7 a week in pay. Union trustees have generally refused to increase pay or to get it. May 1. Painters were raised from \$8 to \$10 a day April 1 and carpenters on May 1 from \$9 to \$10. Plasterers are getting \$12 to \$15 through unions though their regular rate is \$9 a day, Masons get \$10 a day and common laborers \$7.50 a day.

THOMPSON LOCATED

Washington, April 11.—William Boyce Thompson, former director of the finance committee of the Republican National Committee, has not been able to answer subpoenas by the Senate public lands committee because of ill health, William Wallace Jr., of New York, Thompson's attorney told the committee today. Thompson, whose health has been in a precarious condition since the winter of 1921, is recuperating in Arizona, Wallace said.

HIGHEST LIQUOR CLEANUP IN U. S.

Cleveland, Ohio, April 11.—What is declared by United States District Attorney A. E.
