GERMAN CUPIDITY

Germany's finance minister estimates the German national wealth today at forty billion dollars. At the outbreak of the war it was one hundred billion. If Finance Minister Luther is dealing in facts as well as figures, Germany should not be too far from the truth.

But it seems incredible that Germany could have consumed sixty percent of her national wealth during the four years of the World war, so the figures of Germany's minister of finance may bear examination.

However, if the Luther figures are based on fact and Germany has actually shriveled by more than half, there emerges a formidable indictment of the German reparations policy.

Perhaps it is well for Germany and for her recent enemies that the reparations commission through the General Dawes committee is at last devoting all its energy to the reparations issue and Germany's economic ability to pay.

THE GO-BETTER SPIRIT

One would not look for tranquility, calm and suppression of sound and movement in the country which invented the word "pep" and which is famous for its high powered salesmanship, big business and mass industrial production.

High-speed effort is conducive to material progress and is the source of much economic good, but it can not be expected to give the United States of the twentieth century a sufficient strength to fly away into the free air.

The Robin Hood Theory of Taxation

The present system of taxation, in every country in the world, is probably the best evidence of the exceedingly small distance Mankind has traveled along the path of evolution.

The rotten principle that underlies and vitiates all taxation is the theory that taxes should be levied principally upon the rich and that the poor should be spared.

That is one of those spacious theories that, upon its face, has the appearance of justice but in the end works out into injustice invariably.

Its one excuse is the same excuse which was put forward by Robin Hood, the famous bandit. His apology was that he only took from the rich and gave to the poor.

But what he and his admirers failed to see is that robbery of any kind is wrong. It may not seem so bad to steal a diamond necklace from a duchess as to snatch a penny from an equally vicious.

The Income Tax Law, and other tax laws which seek to tax rich people in order to carry on the government, are fundamentally wrong for the simple reason that the purpose of taxation is not to equalize incomes but to pay the expense of the state.

The business of getting all incomes as near as possible down to the same level is not the business of government. The size of incomes is governed by natural laws. To attempt to interfere with those laws by artificial means is to cut the nerve of business enterprises, to discourage thrift, and eventually to reduce a prosperous country like the United States to the peasant grade of Russia.

All talk of passing a just and equitable income tax law is nonsense. There can be no just and equitable income tax. A tax on land values would be logical and equitable.

It would make those people pay toward the upkeep of society who had been most profited by the benefit of society.

Also a Sales Tax would be a fair and honest way to collect sufficient funds to carry on the Government. It would not be vitiated by any notion that every rich man was a quasi criminal and every poor man ought to be coddled.

It would bear fairly upon every spender of money in proportion to the amount he spent.

The heart of the Income tax, Surtax, and Excess Tax idea is Bolshevistic.

These taxes proceed from the idea whose sire is Ignorance and whose dam is Envy the idea that the man who denies himself, acquires his money and accumulates a little capital, ought to be pillaged and the man who had the enterprise and business capacity and earns a large salary and lays up a fortune ought to be penalized for so doing.

And, furthermore, that the lazy and incompetent should be exempt from public responsibility or any share of the public burden.

The prosperity of every country depends upon the number of people in it who are thrifty and the number of those who are capable and energetic in business. Any law that penalizes this class, that finds them and harasses them because they have dared to exercise the most necessary human traits in a state, is an unjust law.

In the national House of Representatives the decent thing to do, if they are going to continue with the present program is to set up a statue to Robin Hood and require every Congressman to wait before it as he enters the halls of "justice."

DAILY NEWS LETTER Honolulu, April 14.—Sea gulls are not common in the Hawaiian Islands, but they are by no means unknown. No one who has a few gulls may be seen flying around ships at the entrance to Honolulu Harbor; when they may disappear for weeks at a time. It is probable that these birds follow steamers down from the Golden Gate. This is a six or seven day trip, but at that the gulls probably get more rest, plus far more than do the pilots which fly down winter from Alaska to Honolulu in the warm Hawaiian sunshine with other tourists. It is said that the pilots make the trip in a matter of days, but at that the gulls occasionally on the water and take rest between flights. The trip for either bird is somewhere around 3,000 miles.

Frank Kuro, one of the Hawaiian divers, who has been diving for weeks in the water front on steamer days, did a high dive "just for the fun of it" from the upper life boats of a round steamer that passed this port some months ago. Frank did the dive well, so well that a "sensible" expert, looking for special attractions for his circus, inquired after the boy and found that he was the best diver of all that Hawaiian diving group that swim out to wheeled coils from the elusive tourist. Some weeks later Frank got a letter that made mere cold diving look very small indeed. New he has headed for the mainland with a \$75 a week contract in his pocket, scheduled to appear in a well known water circus. Recall, all the swimming boys in Honolulu are diving each steamer day to emulate the Kuro dive.

Scientific explorations began last year by the Bishop Museum of Honolulu in cooperation with the United States Navy for special study of infusoria in the west and northwest of the Hawaiian group, will be continued this coming summer with the additional help of the Cleveland Museum of Natural History. Dr. Herbert E. Gregory, director of the Bishop Museum, has directed the work in Honolulu after completing plans for the work with the Cleveland Museum authorities. It is probable that the work will be carried farther west this summer, although the full extent of it has not been mapped out.

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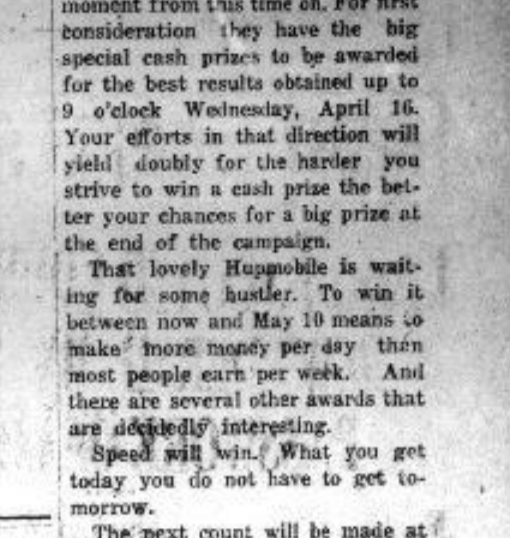
