HORSESHOES

PASSING OF THE ANTELOPE

Men who were boys 25 years ago and revel in reading the hunting and trapping stories of the Far West, most of which were based on wild life conditions as they existed a score of years previous, will suffer a twinge of pain to learn that the American antelope or "pronghorn," is all but doomed.

It is estimated that there are not more than 3,000 antelopes in the United States. One of the best protected herds is that in the Yellowstone National Park and it numbers only 350. It may be seen how a series of hard winters, forest fires or an increase in such animals as coyote and the wolf might reduce the existing herds to but a remnant of the small number now remaining. It would seem, therefore, that the antelope has joined the lion, the grizzly bear and the wild pig, and that in the not far distant future the "pronghorn" will be but a memory.

Wild life authorities cite several probable causes for the rapid disappearance of the antelope. The animal is among the most nervous of the wild herds. It is truly American in many ways. Like the human species which inhabits this land it is inclined to worry. Frightened from its pasture by tourist, fire, or some wild animal, it is slow to return. An increase in settlers in the mountain valleys has eliminated many of the natural pastures, and it is believed that most of the herds pass out through starvation.

HEROINES ARE OLDER NOW

Age is slowly creeping upon the heroines of romantic love but seems to be doing it in the characteristic way age has with woman, very slowly. For the age of the heroine has advanced in more than 50 years over from 17 to 28.

Twenty-eight is now the average for a heroine of a love story, the fact having been established by the examination of more than 27,000 scenarios submitted in a recent contest. Whereas, in 1870, the judges declare, it was 17.

There is another peculiarity about the age of the heroine. In the scenarios submitted by women writers—and these were 60 percent of the entire number—the age of the heroine averaged about five years more than the age of the heroine created by the man writer. Women will see nothing strange in this but will take it as a proof of the efficiency of the beauty parlor, whose secrets every woman knows, but which are intended for the deception of men.

But age is creeping upon the woman politician also, although she will probably not consider it a serious matter. For although a woman becomes a voter at 21, it is the woman of 35 who is going to decide the elections. So says Mrs. Maud Wood Park, president of the League of Women Voters, who says 25 is the age of the woman whose influence is to be felt in politics.

WHY THE CAT COMES BACK

The inevitability of the cat's return is traditional. But it is only now that a scientist has undertaken to discover why. Prof. Francis H. Herrick of Western Reserve University, has a new theory, reached after experiments with numerous cats, purporting to show. One cat came away eight times and it was only on the last, 16 1/2 miles from home, that it failed to show up. It may have met with an accident, so that hardly counts.

Let me be a Gardener of Souls and not a mere Merchant of Facts.

Imbue me with Thy patience that I may thoroughly learn the supreme art of teaching, which is to Wait.

Give me a wise blindness to the faults of exuberance and a wise evaluation of enthusiasms.

Make me sympathetic with youth, that I may not criticize as evil which is nothing but immature.

Teach me never to resort to the folly of reward and punishment but to recognize that every human being wants to learn, wants to be strong and wants to be right; and show me how to unpower and to develop these wants.

Let me never forget the profits of my calling, and that the greatest wealth one can gain in this world is the property right he clears in souls.

Invest me with the true dignity of my office, that I may always have a proper pride in knowing that mine is the highest of all callings, and that no man's business is nobler than his whose office it is to guide and mould the unfolding mind.

Keep me humble that I may continue to learn while I teach.

May I strive not so much to be called Master as to be a Master, not to show authority so much as to have authority.

And give me that joy in my work, that exaltation in my privilege, and that satisfaction in my service that comes from the knowledge that, of all human occupations, that of teaching is most like the business of God Himself.

THAW DENIED CHANCE TO TESTIFY; ATTORNEYS WON'T ASK QUESTIONS

Slayer of Stanford White Stays On Witness Stand But Few Minutes—Court Room Astounded With Unexpected Action.

Philadelphia, Pa., April 17.—Henry K. Thaw was given a few brief minutes on the witness stand in his slaying of Stanford White, but he was denied a chance to testify. The slayer of Stanford White, the architect, was opposed by his attorneys, who said he was not fit to testify.

Thaw's appearance on the stand was dramatic. A pin could be heard dropping as ex-Judge John Patterson, his own lawyer, with a wave of the hand announced Thaw was ready to testify. Thaw, heavy faced, dark hair, now gray, walked bravely to the stand.

There was a dramatic silence. Then Patterson asked him a few questions, suddenly Patterson turning to the opposing lawyers, said: "Here was a battle of legal minds—expert lawyers struggling for the upper hand in a duel of minds."

Arthur Dickson and William A. Gray—consulted. For seven minutes they had their heads together while the spectators waited with high interest.

Gray arose and said: "I have no question." "I have no question," he said. "I have no question," he said.

The courtroom was astounded as none-the-less were the attorneys for Thaw.

These sat in the witness chair, apparently unopposed. He stroked his bushy chin and looked in the direction of his counsel. While the attorneys had been consulting he appeared to be highly nervous and spent the time bearing pieces of paper into shreds.

Patterson summoned Thaw from the stand. The courtroom was in a tumult and almost immediately the court adjourned for the midday recess. Counsel for the Thaw estate and for Thaw's divorced wife, Evelyn Nesbit, indicated during the recess that the reason they did not grill the Pittsburgh Millionaire, was because they have a half a dozen alibis who, they claim, will controvert previous testimony of alienists and prove that Thaw is insane.

It was evident that Thaw himself was disappointed over his denial of a chance to testify. When he took the stand he appeared to be eager—in fact, anxious to testify.

"Your name," asked Patterson when Thaw had seated himself. "Henry K. Thaw," in a firm voice.

"Your age?" "Fifty three."

"How long have you been in the West?" "Pennsylvania State Asylum for the Insane."

"About seven years."

"And you signed a petition to be declared sane?" "Did you not?" "I did."

"And Mr. Thaw, you asked me to put you on the stand so these gentlemen arrayed against you might put any proper questions they desire?"

Thaw hesitated. Then answered affirmatively. It was then Attorney Patterson offered to turn the witness over to the opposing lawyer.

Thaw's jaw fell when Gray announced he had "no questions." His lawyer, stammered, beckoned him from the witness chair. Thaw's jaw was falling, he slipped and almost staggered as he left the stand. He appeared to be a bewildered, broken, faltering man.

"We call Mr. Thaw," Patterson shouted about the tumult.

But new again things went wrong. Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, Thaw's mother was not in the courtroom. She was ill at her hotel.

All was confusion. The judge rapped for order, and then adjourned court.

The drama involving Thaw's appearance on the stand followed a long cross examination of Dr. Charles S. Potts, an alienist. Potts admitted that if Thaw had been guilty of fratricide in the past—he did not admit that was a fact—he "might" be guilty of it again and he might not.

Born Insane
New York, April 17.—Henry K. Thaw was born insane—he will always be insane.

William Travers Jerome, who prosecuted Thaw for the slaying of Stanford White, made this comment today on Thaw's fight to obtain his liberty.

He predicted a repetition of the Gump incident and said he "feared" Thaw would go a step further and kill a boy or a woman.

Result "Foregone Conclusion"
Atlantic, N. J., April 17.—Evelyn Nesbit, divorced wife of Henry K. Thaw, today asserted that the outcome of the present effort of Thaw to prove his sanity at a hearing at Philadelphia is almost a "foregone conclusion."

"Money can do a great deal," she said. "It is just like a Thaw trial. They have ample funds and are always able to produce twenty or thirty witnesses, so that the outcome is nearly always a foregone conclusion."

Mrs. Nesbit, a cabinet singer in a cafe here, is opposing Thaw's attempt to secure his release. From the insane asylum. She has predicted of that within six months after his release, there will be "another Gump case."

"I know Harry Thaw better than anyone else," she declared. "He has not been cured."




