SYMBOLICAL OF YOUTH
All hail the mouth-organ!

It is remarkable in that it is a recognition, by a university that for long has been consecrated to the "learned professions," of the fact that business, or working for money, is entitled to rank with any other human occupation in dignity and importance.

Time was, and that time is not so far past, that only those would be profited by education or welcomed to educational institutions, who had in mind to become gentlemen (by which was understood to be an idle living on dead men's money and devoting his life simply to play) a physician, a lawyer, a clergyman, a school teacher, or some variety of book worm.

The nineteenth century was not only the age of science but also the age when the world began to realize that the value of science and of all learning consisted in its use to humanity.

Business simply means using science for the service of mankind. The two dominating nations of the world, the British Empire and the United States, are business nations. It was not the lure of conquest, it was the desire to extend trade, that has made the British Empire.

The rapid development of the United States has been due to men whose motive was to apply the theories of science, and the opening of inventors to the building of railroads, the opening of mines, the harnessing of waters, and commercial usages of electricity and the conversion of raw material into finished products.

It is the practical application of the spirit of democracy; for democracy means the welfare of the whole people. The great fortunes of these days have not been founded on robber raids, filibustering expeditions nor military conquests. Men have become millionaires in neat packing, oil, steel, clothing, transportation and similar activities for the general well being of the populace.

If the university is to justify itself in the future it must train men for work and not for play; it must equip men for work and not equip them in the art of getting along without work.

It must recognize that the only excuse for talent, brains and genius, is the superior service that can be rendered to mankind. For the superior man is tolerable only when he lives for his fellows and not when he lives on them.

In any right system of education, business, which is nothing but the honest service of man, the clothing, the feeding, sheltering, transporting and beautifying of the life of the multitude, should rank as one of the worthiest of professions.

It is not surprising that the special committee on reclamation which began its work last October now reports to the secretary of the interior that a comprehensive overhauling of the nation's reclamation program is necessary. It has long been apparent that some of the irrigation projects were on a losing basis, and that others could be made to pay only by increasing important capital expenditures.

During the general hard times which hit the farming population those living in irrigated districts have not escaped losses. Hence the entire project assumed new proportions some time ago seeming to require a thorough investigation.

President Coolidge will doubtless soon take action on the recommendations of the special advisory committee, which include such factors as the granting of special credits to provide improvements loans, and permitting the exchange of lands on the part of farmers living on non-productive acres. Most important of all is the suggestion that payment of construction costs shall be based on farm production rather than, as heretofore, on a fixed percentage of the actual cost of construction. In this way provision can be made for the lean and the fat years that occur among irrigation farmers.

BUSINESS A PROFESSION

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"PURE" ENGLISH
Two news dispatches telegraphed across the nation on the same day disclosed a plan for an Academy of Pure English and the dictum of a prominent educator that instruction in English in the schools is a waste of time since the pupils will acquire a knowledge of it through association with their elders. Among other things, the two bits of news isolate two distinct groups of modern thought; the one believing that a knowledge of exact English is of first importance; the other believing that the ability to read and write intelligently is enough for all ordinary purposes.

Out of its perpetual terming and boundless luxuriance "pure English" is ever creating, increasing. Piles of words are now as respectable as the British Museum were once trunks, kicked from every "correct" vocabulary, blacklisted, on the index. Like books, words have their fates. Nobody can predict and nobody should. From period to period, there are not merely death and birth of words and expressions, but relaxations or rigidities of construction, shiftings and changes of cadence and rhythm. The pen and the lips are always at work. Let us do our best to speak and write "pure English"—not too pure, not formal and priggish; and always with a keener ear for the vital, popular speech. The Society for Pure English will help; but somehow we feel sure that the old girl can be trusted to take care of herself.

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Viscount Ishii Says No Threat Intended

Paris, April 18.—Viscount Ishii, Japanese Ambassador to France, declared in an exclusive statement to International News this afternoon that it is unthinkable that any foreign government or its representatives should address a threat to the American government.

The Japanese diplomat added: "Simple common sense forbids any such supposition."

Viscount Ishii was commenting upon the communication sent to the United States Department by Ambassador Hanamura, expressing fears of grave consequences should a law be enacted excluding Japanese immigrants from American territory.

Viscount Ishii expressed hope that the Hanamura document would not be misinterpreted by the American people. His statement was conciliatory and hopeful that any misunderstanding between the two powers would be bridged without bitterness.

No argument therefore can be made for or against which is founded upon an interpretation of the Hanamura note which makes it appear that it contains a threat towards the American government.

"I have no personal knowledge of the so-called Hanamura note except what has been cited in the newspapers. I can only hope that the document was prepared by one of the wisest advisers of the American government. It should be given fair interpretation."

The damage was estimated at \$500,000.
