THE LETTER CARRIER
 By DR. FRANK CRANE

The postal carrier and his co-workers, the postal clerks, are about as important as any other class of the American people. The post office is a part of every man's concern. It has woven itself intimately into our most immediate needs.

And the people of this country are expecting first-class service from men who are paid second-class wages. They are expecting faithful work from men who must be physically sound and above the average in intelligence. And they are foolish enough to expect to get these men for less wages than they pay had carriers and section hands.

Under the present law the letter carrier and postal clerk cannot receive more than \$1,800 per annum. This would be enough if he could live like a Chinese coolie. But he cannot live that way and do his work as we want him to do it.

It is necessary for him to have decent clothes and nourishing food. Also, if he is to be a dependable, normal man, he ought to get married and have children, and to live about as ordinary American citizens live.

And the amount of money it takes the American citizen to live is not a matter of guess work. Experts have figured it out that he ought to have at least \$2,246 per annum to support himself and family of three in a normal, healthy and respectable manner.

The present effort to increase the pay of postal employees is not a matter of sentiment nor a matter of graft. It is a matter of pure business. What it amounts to is that if we keep on paying the present rates we are going to have poor service. No way has yet been discovered to get good, honest work and efficiency without paying for it.

The kind of people who wish to handle our mail matter are not the kind of people who would be happy to have the wife and mother of the children working out in order to keep the home together. The result of our poor pay is that many trained employees are leaving the service and that the Civil Service Commission is having, every year, a harder time to secure a sufficient number of eligibles.

The competent worker in the postal service needs long experience and unerring accuracy and he ought to be a high-grade man who loves his job and is loyal to his employer.

Work in the post office is no insecure, the letter carrier has no soft job.

Every day in the year, rain or shine, he is expected to be at his post. When he does his work well he is helping us all along. When he does his work ill we all become peeved.

Why not pay him a decent wage?

THREE COUNTRIES ACCEPT DAWES REPARATION REPORT

Paris, April 23.—England, Belgium and France today notified the Inter-Allied Reparations Commission they accepted the Dawes plan as a basis for discussion and settlement of the reparations problem. Italy's acceptance is expected tomorrow.

The Commission will meet Tuesday at York to consider the situation. The communication from the various allied countries today were replied to the Commission's recommendation that the Dawes report be accepted.

GOV. SMITH MOURNS DEATH OF MURPHY

Albany, N. Y., April 25.—Governor Al Smith was completely overcome when he received word at the executive mansion today from Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall.

With his eyes filled with tears and his voice choking with emotion the governor kept repeating: "It's not real—it's awful!"

"Boys," said the governor as he wiped away the tears, "no man ever had a better friend than I did in Charles F. Murphy. No one will ever know how I'll miss him."

The governor said he was first notified of Mr. Murphy's death by Adjutant General Berry.

"When General Berry called me on the telephone and told me that Mr. Murphy was dead, I was fairly dumbfounded," the governor told several newspaper men who called at the executive mansion.

"Why I couldn't believe," he continued, "I told General Berry that many times reports like this are unfounded but he assured me that the veteran leader had gone."

"Even then I couldn't bring myself to realize what had happened. Quickly I put in two telephone calls to New York one to Tammany Hall and the other to police headquarters."

"The governor said he finally got in touch with New York city police headquarters and that some one at the other end assured him that Mr. Murphy was dead. A few minutes later the governor said, he got Daniel Ryan on the telephone at Tammany Hall.

"When Dan Ryan said the chief was dead I knew then that I had lost the best friend a man ever had," the governor said.

The governor was so filled with emotion over the passing of Mr. Murphy that he could not speak for several minutes when he came down from his private office on the second floor of the mansion to see the newspapermen. He walked out to a table and for what seemed many minutes stood with bowed head. Finally he said:

"I can't tell you how I feel. Then the governor seemed to get control of his feelings and for a few minutes he talked of how he first learned of the death of his life long friend.

The governor said he would have a written statement on the day on Murphy's death.

CHANGING BASIC LAW
 A pending constitutional amendment would require at least one branch of a state legislature to have been elected subsequent to the submission to the legislature of a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States. The plan would empower the state to refer proposed amendments to the people and would enable them to elect state representatives who would obey their will with respect to ratification or rejection.

This change seems to be an improvement over existing conditions. The history of constitutional amendments indicates that organized minorities may be able to effect ratification in legislatures against the will of the unorganized majority. At any rate, that allegation has been made, and it is worth while to make consummation of such injustice impossible. The people should always have opportunity to study proposed changes of their basic law and to make their will effective through their legislatures.
