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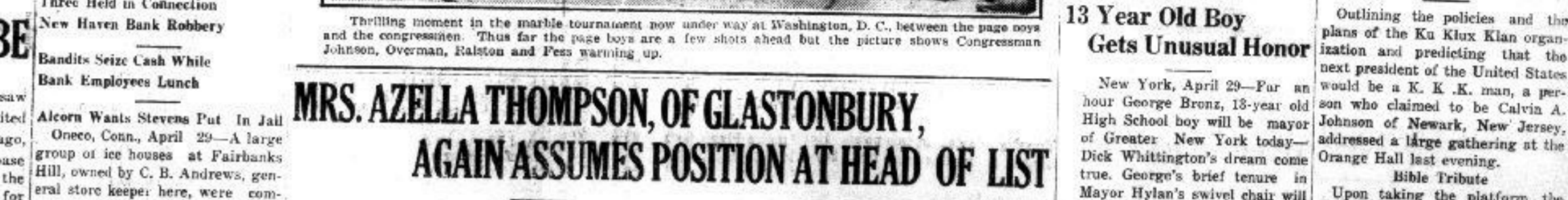

Large Crowd Listens to Address by Member of "Sitting Pretty" in Washington—Local Newspaper Reporters Banished From Hall in Midst of Meeting.

13 Year Old Boy Gets Unusual Honor

New York, April 29—For an hour George Brent, 13-year-old high school boy will be mayor of Greater New York today—Dick Whittington's dream come true. George's brief tenure Mayor Hylan's widow claim to inaugurate "Industry and citizenship" day in the Boys Week celebration.

Other boys will act as managers of large city hotels, department stores, and open and close the Stock Exchange. The boy mayor will have at his back and call a comptroller and five borough presidents, all youngsters.

"Sitting Pretty" Johnson, he said that the Ku Klux Klan was a powerful organization and as the speaker unfolded the program he said that the Klan was the only organization in the world that was not a religion. "You people would be surprised if you only knew who is at the head of the K. K. K.," he said. "I have tried to stop as in some states, I am not to you but the organization has steadily increased in its membership. There are over 15 million members in this country."
