The Rules of the Game
By DR. FRANK CRANE

There is no game that can possibly be played without keeping the rules. You cannot even play solitaire, and get any run out of it, if you cheat yourself.

You cannot enjoy a game of golf, or even of checkers or of marbles unless you keep the rules.

You could not ride along the street in your automobile unless you and others obeyed the rules of the road.

And morality itself is practically nothing more than keeping the rules of the game.

It is not to a place supposed to be a happy outlook for the country that we are to look for a happy outlook for the country.

Such are a few of the insights into the ways and wiles of public men as revealed by a volume from the pen of one of Washington's best known commentators—Lionel Lincoln.

Carrying this play a bit further, "Lionel" runs all his shills wrapped up in a hot speech on a warm day, and the speaker is not better by discarding not only his coat, but following it with a coat, then his vest—and then comes a set of repetitive stunts at the lawbreaker.

What is happening every day in the fire menace and waste, shows clearly enough that we are still a very long way from indulgence in our cautioning against fire.

There are opportunities in the situation for all to contribute towards reducing these calamitous losses, and practicing a kind of thrift that is indeed worth while.
