PERISHABLE GOODS

All but an insignificant minority of the novelists of today, it is believed began their writing careers with the desire to achieve fame or to satisfy a creative urge as the main incentive.

Since fame, glory, and a place among the immortals of literature are the questions that have been most prominent in our novelists' minds, there is a good deal of irony in the statement made by Simon L. Nye, president of the American Booksellers' Association, at the annual convention of that organization in New York City that almost without exception a contemporary book of fiction, after having been published three months, is "practically dead, forgotten, and awaiting removal to the bargain table."

Contemporary novels have become, from the bookseller's standpoint, perishable goods because the craze for novelty has advanced to the point where book buyers are not satisfied unless they can get fiction which is just of the press.

It suffers also from the fact that it does not merit so much as some lucky bit of advertising will frequently make a book a "best seller."

PHILIPINO FACTS... The Philippines are 7083 islands off the coast of Asia, almost straight west from Guatemala, in Central America.

They were taken over by the United States at the close of the war with Spain. We paid money for them. Since then their government has been controlled by the United States, at least in part.

There is a movement on foot, both there and here, to secure their independence. The reasons why they want independence are, as they allege, that the Philippines themselves desire it, that the United States has promised it, that they have established a stable government and are maintaining it, that there is no danger of foreign aggression, that long distance government is unsatisfactory and that, much as they love America, they love freedom more.

On the other hand, President Coolidge, on March 5th, wrote to Manuel Roxas, head of the special mission from the Philippines, which is over here trying to get independence, and expressed the following opinion:

That many Filipinos themselves believe that independence now would be a misfortune, that a majority of Americans would further delay, that the welfare of the Philippines is improved by this delay, that they could not afford an army, navy and diplomatic service, that they might lose their independence if we withdrew our support, and some other things.

Advocates of both sides of the question are undoubtedly sincere and have the welfare of the Philippines and of the human race at heart. It is a matter to be decided by good judgment and not by passion, denunciation and revolution.

It is only the President's opinion; Congress must finally decide the question and may disagree with him.

SENATE PASSES BONUS OVER COOLIDGE'S VETO

SCANT MARGIN OF TWO VOTES GIVES SENATE NECESSARY TWO-THIRDS TO OVER-RIDE COOLIDGE'S VETO-VOTE IS 59 TO 26—BONUS NOT TO BE CASH.

Washington, May 19.—The five year fight to provide a bonus for America's four million world war veterans was finally won today.

Discarding President Coolidge's opposition and harsh condemnation the Senate this afternoon performed the last act in making the additional compensation possible by passing the soldiers bonus bill over the president's veto.

The veto has already been overridden by the house so the senate's action puts the legislation on the statute books. The senate vote was fifty-nine to twenty-six, a margin of two votes.

The bonus will not be in cash, as was provided by the bill which President Harding vetoed in 1921, and which congress failed to pass over his veto but it will be in the form of paid up insurance policies, which will have a cash loan value at the end of two years and which may be exchanged for cash at the end of twenty years. The value of the policies will be determined by the extent of the service each individual of \$1 a day for domestic service and \$1.25 a day for service overseas.

The average policies will range between \$900 and \$1,000.

Blasts occurred on either the top or next to the top floor of the factory, which employs hundreds of printers.

Wreckage, falling, demolished automobiles in the street below.

U. S. JAPANESE ENVOY RESIGNS

Washington, May 19.—Cyrus E. Woods, American ambassador to Japan, has tendered his resignation to President Coolidge and asked to be relieved of his duties at Tokyo as soon as the President can conveniently replace him, it was learned here today.

Nothing connected with the present immigration situation was in any way responsible for Ambassador Woods' decision to retire, officials said.

His health in his immediate family and other personal reasons prompted the decision, it was said.
