(Continued From Page One) other would endorse the League in principle, but make no commitment without a national referendum. As a result of full committee conference last night, the task of drafting members today is to take alternative plans submitted yesterday and so combine them they will be acceptable to all extreme factions. Under this plan, the new platform would:

Denounce "K" by Name. Denounce the Klan by name, but so often the language as to cause a little trouble as possible. Enforce the league policies of Woodrow Wilson, but avoid pleading America's innocence at the entrance. The Bryan plank urging all the nations of the world to join in a program for declaration of war only after a national referendum. Prohibition plans call for law enforcement without mentioning the Eighteenth Amendment. Civilian may be saved, but it will never look the same again.

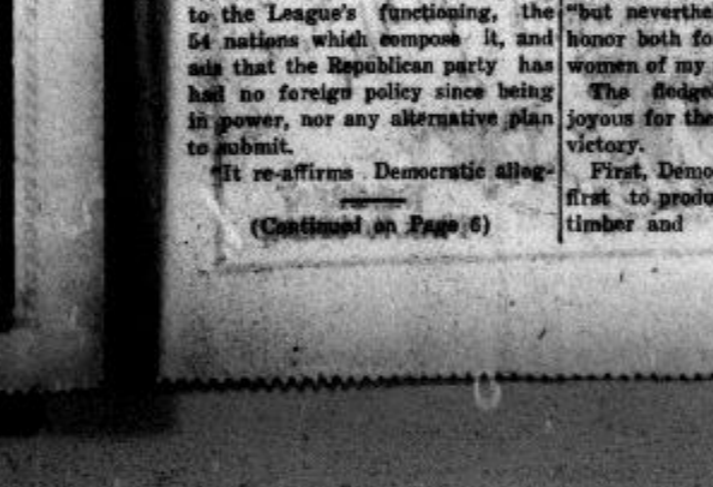

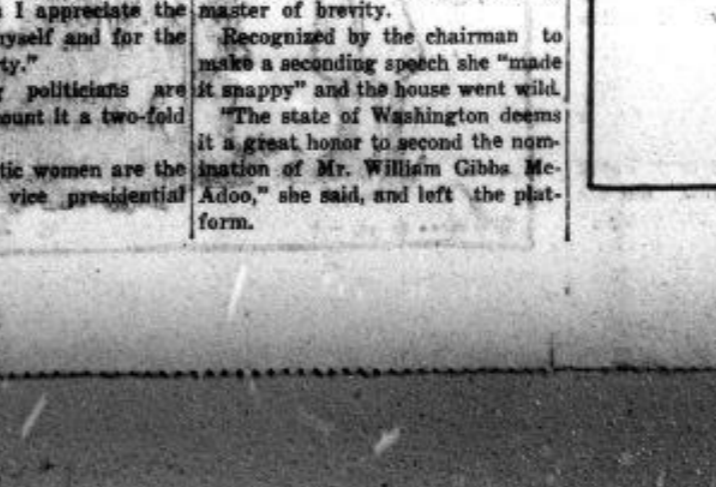

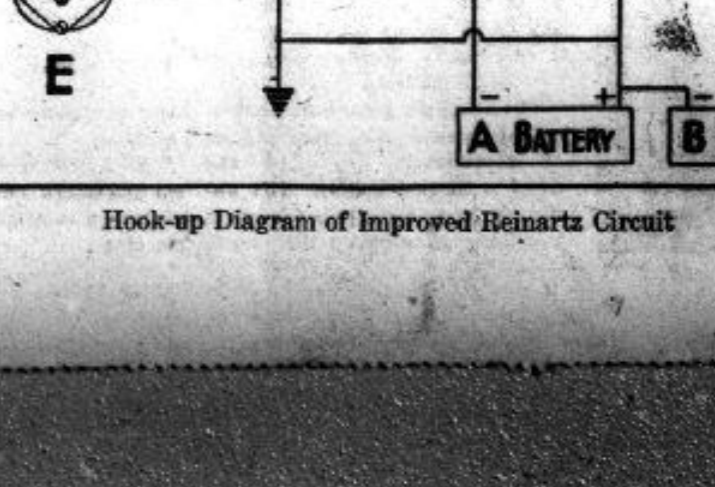
