COAST TO COAST AIRPLANE MAIL SERVICE OPENS

New York, July 1.—Along the sky trail blazed by Kelly, MacReady and Maughan, the air-mail today, a flood of letters bearing "air mail" stamps flooded in upon the station at Haverhill field, Long Island, where it will be transported to the continent.

The first stop from this end is Bellefonte, Pa., whence the planes proceed to Colverton, Bryan, Chicago, Iowa City, Omaha, North Platte, Cheyenne, Rawlins, Rock Springs, Salt Lake City, Elko, Reno and San Francisco.

Another plane leaves San Francisco with eastbound mail over the coast route, and daily thereafter the service will be maintained in both directions against the continent.

Textile Department of Trade School Has Interesting Sericulture Display

Showing How Silk is Raised in Europe—Silk Worms Raised in Town From Eggs Brought From Italy.

In order that workers in the local silk mills may know just how all is raised in the Orient and in Europe; the Textile Department of the State Trade School has arranged at Walden, Brotherton on Monday, June 29, to hold an interesting sericulture display.

Character of instruction given is such that young men completing have a broad and thorough foundation in the successful manufacture, application and distribution of silk in any form. Men with this knowledge will eventually become foremen and heads of departments.

The co-operative textile course was first originated in January, 1921 with a group of fourteen students. At the close of the school year of 1924, there are twenty-one students, an increase of approximately 100 per cent.
