Federal Telephone Means Convicted, End Tonight Faces the Limit
After Midnight Toll Calls Will Be Freed Under New Law.
Telephone users appreciate the announcement that the taxing of telephone toll messages is to come to an end at midnight tonight, according to L. C. Clifford, local manager of The Telephone Co. Company today on the repeal of the federal revenue act of 1921 under which the taxes were imposed. Mr. Clifford said that the telephone company anticipates and is prepared for a marked increase in traffic after the expiration of calls of the "short haul" type.
Walls most of the provisions of the new federal tax became effective with the signature of President Coolidge on June 2, or were retroactive, as in the case of federal income taxes, the action being a day with the telephone and telegraph message tax was expressly delayed to be effective thirty days after the enactment of the law. The period expires at midnight tonight.
"By far the greatest number of toll calls are to points that are relatively nearby," said Mr. Clifford, "and in commenting on the effect of the removal of the tax, 'The law provided that there should be a 5 per cent tax on telephone messages for which the charge was more than 10 cents and not more than 50 cents. Where the charge for service was more than 50 cents, the tax was 10 cents.'"

The man who actually stole the flag, however, is still at large.
The flag was recovered from a laundry's hotel where it was hidden and will be restored to the American embassy by the Japanese authorities. Information from the confidential source of the two men under arrest—two prominent members of an anti-Mussolini movement—led to the recovery of the flag.
