He walked to Edinburgh, where he invested his silver in linen and laces, beads, ribbons and gaudy things, attractive to feminine folk. He made a pack of them all, which he belted on his back, and he started out as a peddler. He traded in London. He arrived in dirt and rags, and with a big idea.

This big idea has since proved itself the backbone of the economic world. It is the center, the nucleus, of world rebuilding now. William Patterson was the lad's name, and from his idea grew the Bank of England, which laid the foundation of the commercial prosperity of England and made a safe, sure and secure financial center for the commercial enterprise of the entire world.

And every man, in every business, everywhere, so long as our economic system lasts, is, whether he knows it or not, more indebted to this man's one idea for his own comfort and happiness than to all of his own best exertions. 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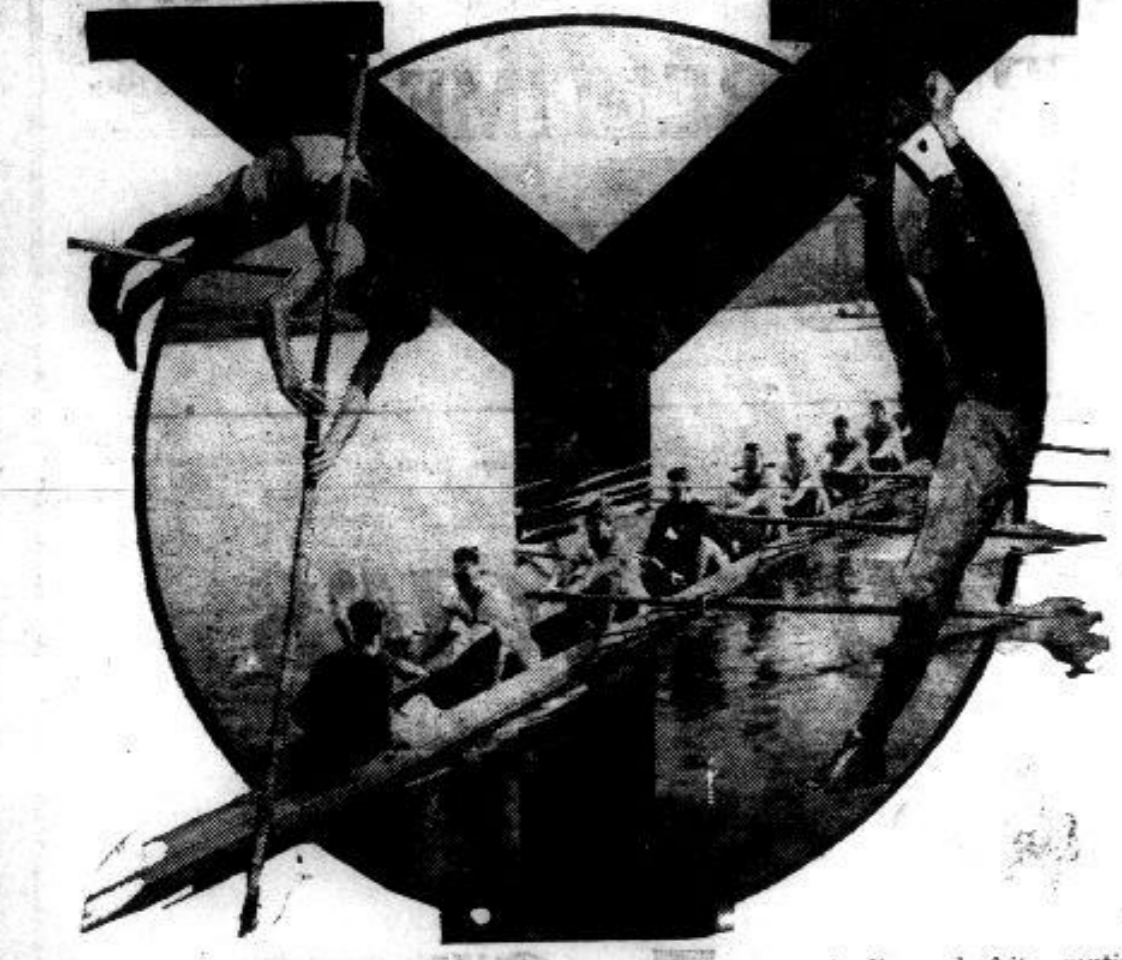
