The South Manchester Water Company is announcing a new schedule of Water rates going into effect on July 1, 1924, this new schedule being necessary to bring to the Company

an income sufficient to care for its greatly increased expense.

The Company's plant (previous to its present extension) has been largely built under pre-war cost and this fact and the reasonable maintenance charges and taxes of this prewar period has enabled the Company to pay its expenses and earn a small return on the investment with a comparatively low schedule of rates. The great increase in the cost of all labor, materials and taxes which came with the war has, how ever, greatly reduced the net income and has left a very small net return on the Company's investment. In addition to the above, the growth of the Town having exceeded the available water supply of the Company's old reservoir system, it has been found necessary to acquire and develop a new source of water supply and in doing this the Company has had to protect the future development of the Town by acquiring a supply adequate to meet the needs of a considerable period ahead. The construction of a new reservoir, pipe line and filtration plant is now well advanced and water from the Roaring Brook supply will be available in a few months. Unfortunately, the construction work of this new development has had to be carried out under high cost of labor and material and the Company's investment will be very seriously increased, The owners of the Company realize that it will not be possible to make rates sufficiently high to pay a reasonable interest return at once on the new, as well as on the old, plant, but are willing to await the growth of their business to furnish proper dividends on their stock. They must, however, have sufficient net income to pay expenses and the interest on the funds borrowed to build the new plant. The new schedule of rates should just about do this, provided a charge for fire

service is also made. The new rates for family and commercial service will ompare favorably with those in force in other places having similar conditions and taking into account the fact that this Company furnishes free installation of cervice pipes. To care for the charge of fire service it is proposed to base this upon a charge per hydrant of \$10.00 per year flat plus a service charge of about 1c per foot of main pipe multiplied by the diameter of the pipe in inches. This is the system in force in many localities, notably in Bridgeport and Ansonia, Connecticut, where it received the approval of the Public Utilities Commission. It will be necessary to make the contract for this service with the South Manchester Fire District and with those having private hydrants. The Company regrets the necessity of raising its rates





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
