Second Grad. Did we share much in the activities of the school?
Father Time. There was a slight decrease, but this happened because the clubs included members from the three upper classes. The Sophomore-Freshman Dramatic Club had a large percentage of sophomores. This club presented "The Arrival of Kitty" in the spring. Most of the cast was made up of sophomores.
First Grad. I'll never forget Frank Robinson as he appeared on the stage dressed as Kitty!

Father Time. Edith Brown won the tennis championship this year. Another outstanding event that I note is the class party. There was a great improvement in the dancing of most of the young men.
First Grad. What do you see in your book for our Junior year, Father Time?
Father Time. This seems to be a year in which you concentrated on social activities.
Second Grad. Which one is the most vivid?
Father Time. I would say the Junior Prom. Eric Rautenburg, as the Junior Class President, had the distinguished honor of leading the Grand March.
Scene: Eric Rautenberg and Ethel Mohr in formal dress as for the Prom.
Second Grad. Didn't we play an important part in the Clubs or Athletic teams?
Father Time. In the spring, the Sock and Buskin Club presented "Reach for the Moon" and several members of your class took part, among whom were Evelyn Peterson and Edgar Clarke..
Scene: Evelyn Peterson and Edgar Clarke reaching for the moon which is fixed on the wall.
Father Time. During that year, Coach Greer produced a wonderful soccer team which lost only one game. Your class was well represented on the team. And now for your senior year,-the last stages of your journey through M. H. S.
