



With our whole hearts and soul.




Foreword

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
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
In Memoriam

Class History

AN INTERVIEW WITH FATHER TIME

First Grad. May we read it?

Father Time. Assuredly.

(*Father Time turns the pages of the book until he finds the poem. Then he turns the book toward the graduates.*)

First Grad. (*reading*)

I sank my roots in Manchester.
I could have asked for more,
But I was happy here in town
So never saw its door.

My roots first sapped the grammar school
But later M. H. S.
My mind engulfed the higher arts,
Enlarged my scope, I guess.

The days I spent were happy ones,
Those memories will cling,
At least I feel assured they will,
Until I meet my King.

Second Grad. I say, you must be very busy in giving aid to so many. Do you think you can spare us enough time for our greedy and trifling wants?

Father Time. I am glad to see that you practice what you learned in school about good manners. As for the time needed, there is a time and place for anything that one desires to do if he is patient. I can start right away. If you don't mind drawing the curtains aside, I will clarify the history by illustrating parts of it. First, I shall show a scene illustrating the first few days at high school when the students became somewhat confused in their new environment.

Scene: Three students conversing as they meander along the corridor.

1st student: Well, how'd I know that was the wrong room?

2nd student: Gee! What a place. You all have to sit in alphabetical order and keep changing rooms.

3rd student. Yeah! And then my name was written just as plain as black and white outside Miss Burke's room and then when I went inside she said she was sorry, but I was in the wrong room.

Father Time. (*Refers to book*) No doubt this scene reminds you of a September day in 1930, when you entered M. H. S. as a freshman. Soon you gave your support to the various clubs, each according to your taste and inclination.

Scene: Tableau of the Clubs—Debating Club, Glee Clubs, Dramatic Club, Latin Club and the Floating Herald.

Father Time. Then came the class elections. After the smoke of battle cleared, you found that John McKenna was to be your President. Soon afterward, the Class purchased a painting entitled, "The Santa Fe Trail", to be awarded to the home room which showed the greatest improvement in citizenship. It was won by Miss McGuire's room and was permanently established there after it had been on exhibition in each of the freshman home rooms.

Scene: Exhibition of "The Santa Fe Trail".

Second Grad. That was a keen contest and I enjoyed looking at the picture during the time it was in my room.

First Grad. Did any of the students win prizes in the freshman year?

Father Time. Phyllis Moroney was clever enough to capture an honor. She won a prize for her short story which was published in "Somanhis," the school publication to which several members of your class have contributed numerous articles. That covers practically all of the major events of your freshman year. Now for the sophomore year. What would you like to know first?

First Grad. I think I remember the officers. Was not Thomas Johnston the president and Eleanor Patten, vice-president?

Father Time. Yes, and Anita Passacantell was secretary, and John McKenna was treasurer.

Second Grad. Wasn't Tom the only member of the varsity basketball team?

Father Time. Yes. He was the first-string center. Speaking of sports, I note that "Chucky" Smith and Eric Rautenburg were playing second base and center field respectively on the "Varsity Nine".

First Grad. Were there any other students that were outstanding?

Father Time. (reading) On this page it says that Marjorie Wilson and Margaret Kompanik won W. C. T. U. prizes. During the year John Hutt was concertmaster of the orchestra.

Second Grad. Did we share much in the activities of the school?

Father Time. There was a slight decrease, but this happened because the clubs included members from the three upper classes. The Sophomore—Freshman Dramatic Club had a large percentage of sophomores. This club presented "The Arrival of Kitty" in the spring. Most of the cast was made up of sophomores.

First Grad. I'll never forget Frank Robinson as he appeared on the stage dressed as Kitty!

Second Grad. And I'll never forget the club's president, Edgar Clark, as a negro porter!

Father Time. Edith Brown won the tennis championship this year. Another outstanding event that I note is the class party. There was a great improvement in the dancing of most of the young men.

First Grad. What do you see in your book for our Junior year, Father Time?

Father Time. This seems to be a year in which you concentrated on social activities.

Second Grad. Which one is the most vivid?

Father Time. I would say the Junior Prom. Eric Rautenburg, as the Junior Class President, had the distinguished honor of leading the Grand March.

Scene: Eric Rautenberg and Ethel Mohr in formal dress as for the Prom.

Second Grad. Didn't we play an important part in the Clubs or Athletic teams?

Father Time. In the spring, the Sock and Buskin Club presented "Reach for the Moon" and several members of your class took part, among whom were Evelyn Peterson and Edgar Clarke..

Scene: Evelyn Peterson and Edgar Clarke reaching for the moon which is fixed on the wall.

Father Time. During that year, Coach Greer produced a wonderful soccer team which lost only one game. Your class was well represented on the team. And now for your senior year,—the last stages of your journey through M. H. S.

First Grad. Oh, yes, I remember what a shock it was to learn, during the summer, that C. P. Q. would not be with us in September. You recall he left to become headmaster of Cushing Academy.

Second Grad. We were saddened to lose such a good friend and leader, but we were happy that Mr. Illing was selected to take his place and that we would complete our high school career, as we had started it, under his leadership.

First Grad. Wasn't the *SOMANHIS*, except for the class year book, discontinued in our senior year?

Father Time. Let's see (*looks it up in book*) Yes, it was, but there was a year book, with Fred Johansson as Editor-in-chief and Marjorie Wilson and William Gray as his co-editors. A school newspaper, with Walter Forber and Florence DeVito as co-editors, was published in the Manchester Herald twice a week, and furnished news of the varied activities of the school.

First Grad. Oh, yes! I remember now. That was a good idea. It gave the students a chance to get their names "in print", and also gave the townspeople information on just what was going on in the school.

Second Grad. Yes! And they had jokes, cartoons, and remember they had a picture of the cast in the Sock and Buskin play? What was the name of that play, Father Time?

Father Time. "I'll Leave It To You."

First Grad. Oh, please tell us!

Father Times "I'll Leave It To You."

Second Grad. Oh, Father Time, we really want to know! Haven't you recorded it?

Father Time. I mean that the name of it was "I'll Leave It To You."

First Grad. (the mistake dawns upon him) Oh! Of course, I remember.

Father Time. The cast for "I'll Leave It To You" included many members of your class—Evelyn Peterson, Sally Potts, Eleanor Wallace, Alma Andrulot, Bessie Quinn, Edgar Clarke, Fred Lavey and Frank Robinson.

Second Grad. And it was good, too! It seems to me, too, that I recall some athletic records broken by members of our class.

Father Time. Why yes! I was just coming to that. Harold Cude broke a record in track in the 440 yard dash.

Scene: Showing Harold Cude breaking the tape.

Father Time. And then Robert Carney splashed his way to a new record in the 200 yard free style swimming race. The tennis championships were won by two seniors, Edith Brown and Leonard Harris. In the line of awards, Victoria Piescik, William Luetgens and Donald Harrison, all in your class, were awarded prizes for their essays in the Auto Show contest.

First Grad. Were there any scholarships offered to individual students?

Father Time. Yes. William Gray, Anthony Gryk and Irving Comber were offered scholarships to Clark University.

Second Grad. Say! That's going some. I guess I didn't realize how brilliant our class was.

First Grad. That is great. Have you anything listed in your book in the line of parties? It seems to me I recall a senior party.

Father Time. Of course, I have everything listed in my book. You had a "Senior Soft Spots Cabaret", including in the evening's entertainment, songs, monologues, chorus and also dances.

Scene: Tap dance by Ursula Segerdahl.

Father Time. And then there were other presentations by certain groups known as the Hill Billies and the Hermits. During the "Last Round-up" which was held at 10 o'clock, Sally Potts lisped a few childish observations.

Scene: Sally Potts—monologue.

Second Grad. That was a grand party, and didn't we have a special Senior Day?

Father Time. Yes, France has her Bastille Day, but you had your Senior Fun Day. All the seniors scraped up their most ridiculous clothes.

Scene: Showing Olga Kwash and Irving Comber in costume.

First Grad. Gee! I remember that day all right. The girls had hair ribbons and rag dolls and animals, and the boys bedecked themselves in ridiculous-looking clothes from high silk hats and cutaways to overalls tattered and torn.

Second Grad. And then remember the baseball game which was held in the afternoon in the pouring rain?

Father Time. The Hermits and the Bull Necks were the opposing teams and Irving Comber the umpire.

First Grad. We could never forget that.

Father Time. Here I find there was a celebration of Arbor Day by the planting of a senior class tree. A very effective Arbor Day speech was delivered by William Gray, President of the Senior Class.

I understand that this event took place, for the first time, in the history of Manchester High School. Your class deserves much credit and esteem. And now would you like to recall the members in the class of 1934 who were in the Hall of Fame?

First Grad. Surely, that's just what we want to know.


ITEM 2: Our social ability, grown steadily surer and more poised year by year, through participation in class functions of various types.


