Our mem'ries here our hearts shall warm.

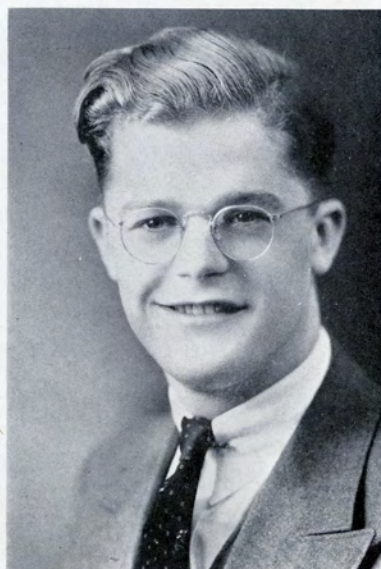

The organization attended the State Interscholastic Press Conference held at Bridgeport on May 2.



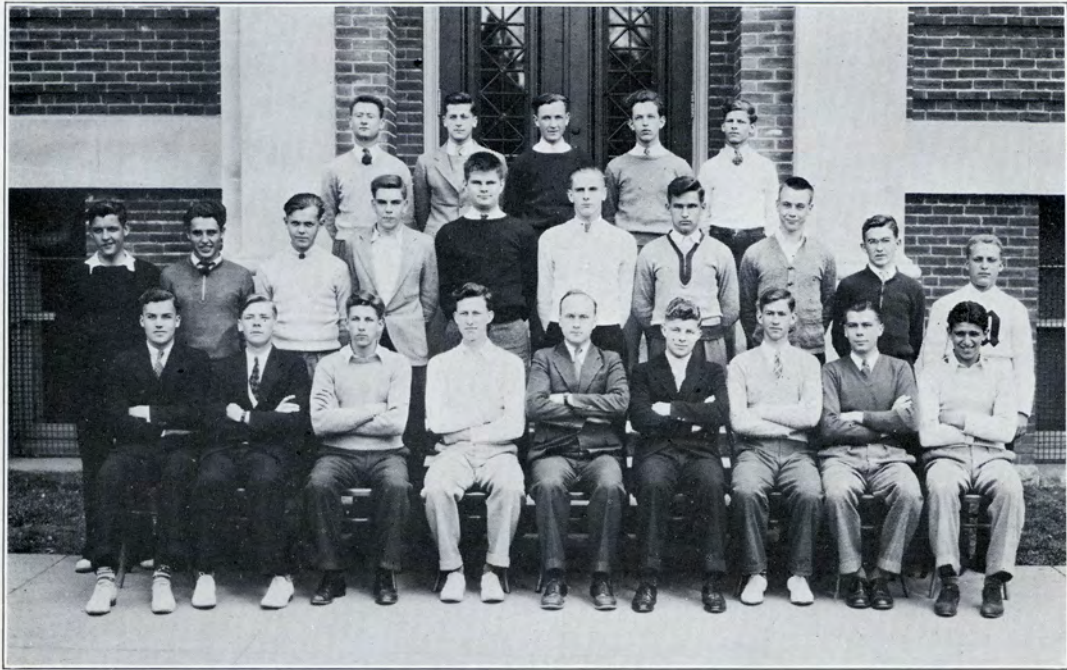

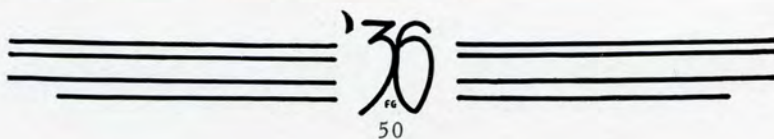


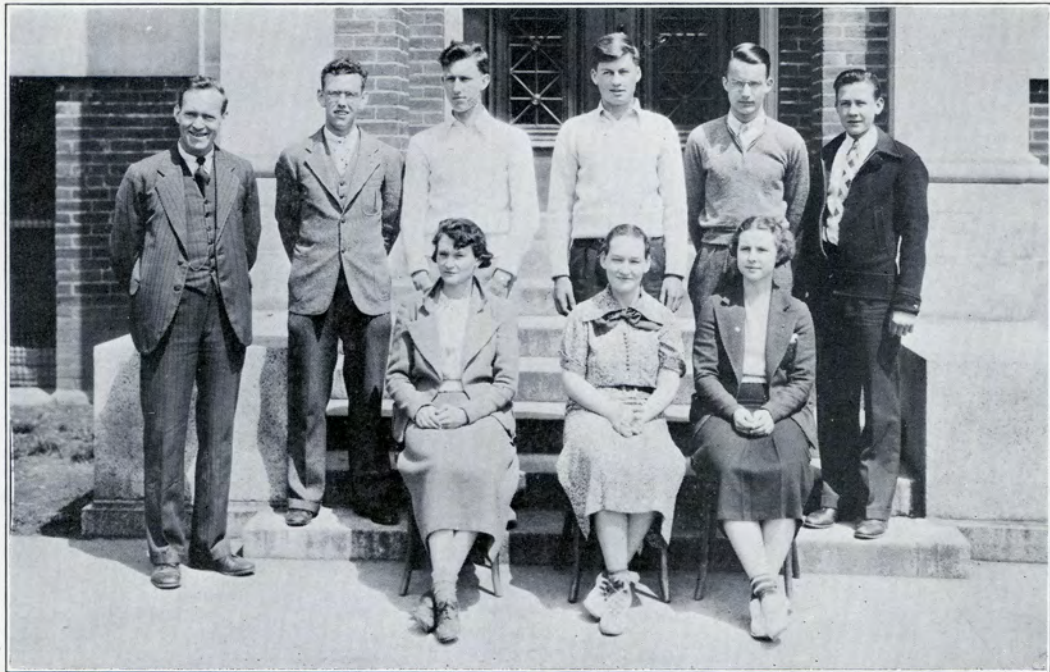

In connection with the Art Club, an Art Service Squad was formed last fall.



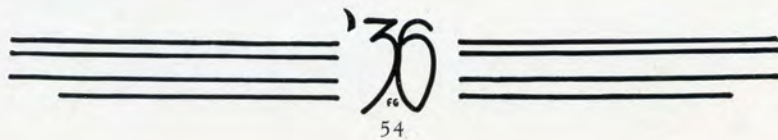

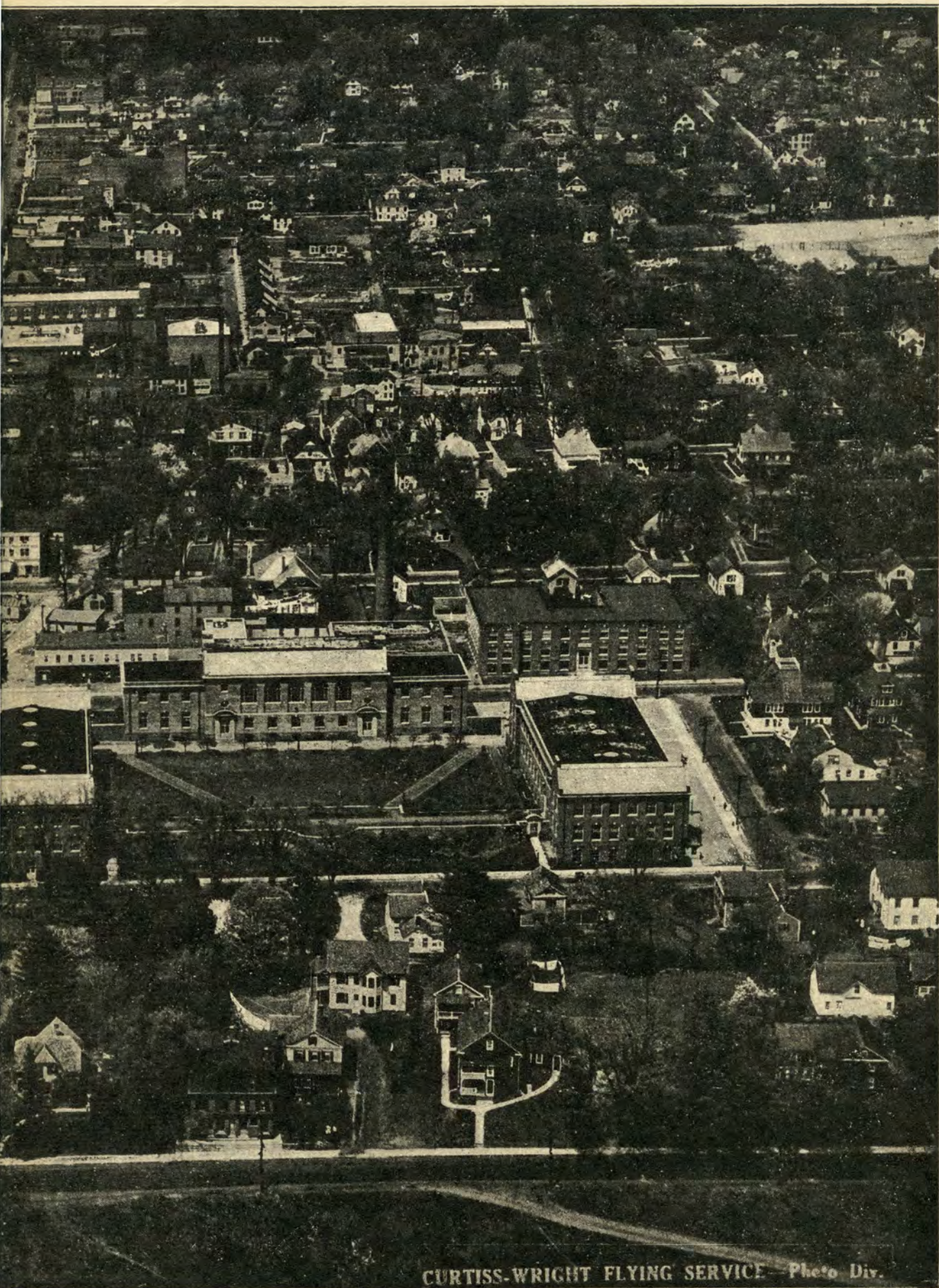
