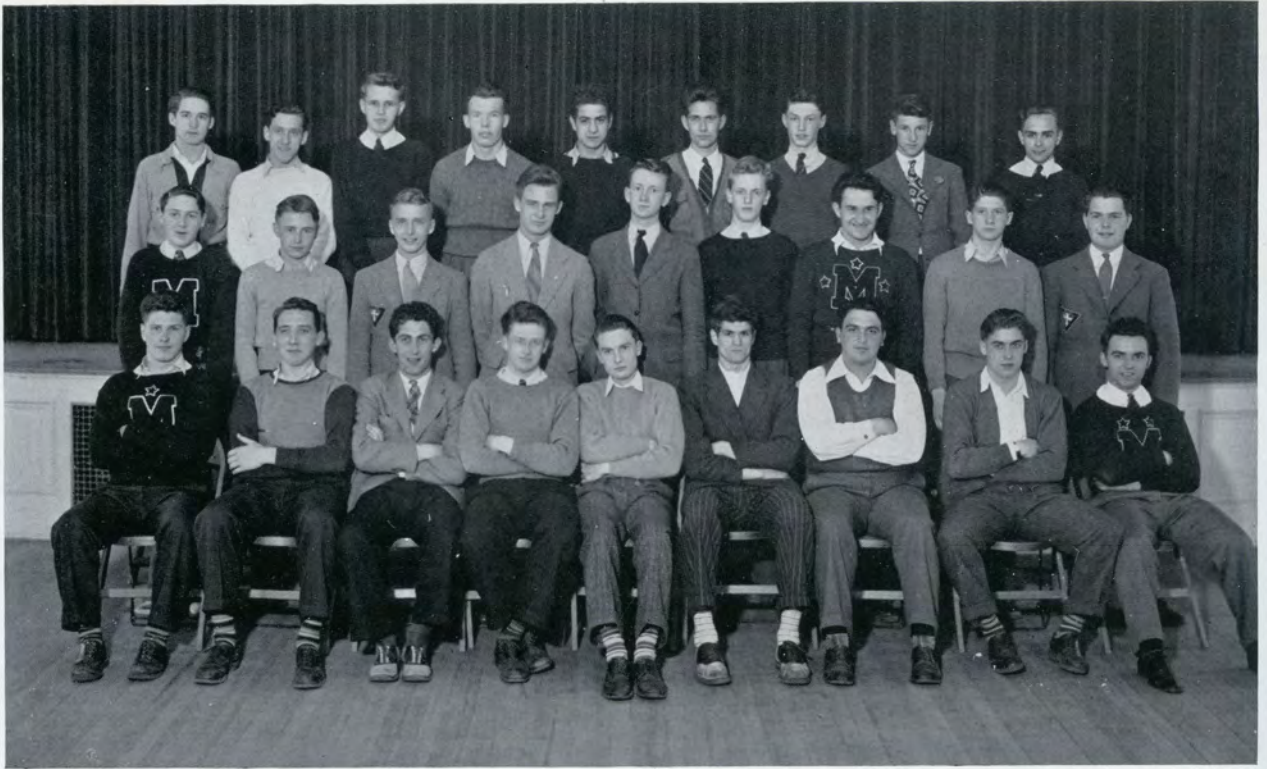
In December, several members presented a play entitled "The Christmas Voice," for the Business and Profes-

A Freshman Debating Club was organized by Mr. David Hartwell. This club held many interesting inter-club debates on subjects requiring less formal research. Mr. Hartwell also assisted Mr. Dougherty in preparing the varsity squad for their debates.

On the State Tournament debates, Manchester's negative team defeated Enfield 3-0 but the affirmative dropped a close decision of 1-2 to Hartford Public High School.

The Chess Club was one of the new clubs formed during 1939-40. The club was organized during the first weeks of the school year when Mr. Clarence B. Eichman became the club adviser. The club held meetings in the Physics Laboratory on Thursday mornings. A tournament was arranged among club members to determine members of a team.

A chess meet was held between Manchester High and Hartford Public High

on February seventh in which Manchester gained a moral victory by holding the powerful Hartford team to one game won, one lost, and three games drawn when the time limit expired. Manchester won its next victory by the default of the Weaver High School, who cancelled a return match. The Manchester club planned for a meet with Loomis Institute and Bulkeley High School of Hartford.



SOMANHIS EVENTS

1915-1940

- 1915 During the fall an editorial board was organized to prepare the first school magazine. The idea for the first issue was originated by the principal, Mr. John Backus and carried through for the greater part by Miss Fannie Rexford, the Junior-Senior English instructor. Miss Gladys Keith suggested the title SOMANHIS from the words—"South Manchester High School."
- 1915 The Franklin Building was erected for the use of Trade School pupils.
- 1915-16 The joint editors of the first *Somanhis Events* were Priscilla Crosby and Clifford Gorman.
- 1916 "In the first few months of 1916, as we see the smoke of battle settling thickly over Europe and hear the rumbling of war on our own southwestern border, we think of the vast amount of history that is in the making."
- 1916 There were 392 students enrolled with a faculty of 15 members.
- 1916 The first issue of *Somanhis Events* contained an article "South Manchester High School—The Past" and in this it is learned that in June, 1896, there was a class of six pupils in the first graduating class.
- 1916 From an essay entitled: "How I Keep Safe on Roads and Streets"—
"When entering a car, if there is any choice, I should take a middle seat. This will protect me in case the car should be struck, for the middle is more likely to remain undamaged."
- 1916-17 Ronald Ferguson was editor of the first Commencement issue of *Somanhis Events* and Robert E. Hathaway was business manager. Pictures of ten Seniors and appropriate quotations were placed on each page.
- 1917 Mid-year exams, the first ever held in South Manchester High School, were given January 31st, February 1st, and 2nd.
- 1917 "A telephone has been installed on the second floor in Principal Backus' office."
- 1917 Four issues of *Somanhis Events* were published.
- 1917 "Have U Bought Your Liberty Bond of the Second Liberty Loan?"
- 1917 "*Somanhis Events* had a basketball team—played two games and won both."
- 1921 Article on bobbed hair—"It surely is a sad fate. But cheer up girls—by 1940 you will again possess your golden locks."
- 1923 "One Hundred Years Old is this town. . . . The Pageant . . . a thousand participants. . . . Manchester is a town of progress and advancement . . . forty thousand people viewed it."
- 1925 The Freshmen were transferred from the Main Building to the Franklin Building.
- 1930 The title of our school paper was changed to *Somanhis*.
- 1932 "The student body assembled at Educational Square to welcome the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress Titt of Manchester, England. The town was presented with a plaque which had been carved by hand from a solid oak which grew in Manchester, England."
- 1933-34 The *High School World*, a semi-weekly publication appearing in the Manchester *Evening Herald* supplanted the three literary issues of the *Somanhis*. One issue of *Somanhis*, the Commencement number, was published.
- 1935A The first mid-year class was graduated from Manchester High School.
- 1938 The class set a precedent by holding its Class Picnic at Moodus.
- 1940 Sixteen hundred and fifty-two students were enrolled with a faculty membership of fifty-three.
- 1940 A pay telephone was installed on the ground floor of the Main Building for the benefit of the students.
- 1940 A portrait of Mr. F. A. Verplanck, Teacher—Principal—Superintendent from 1893 to 1935, was unveiled.

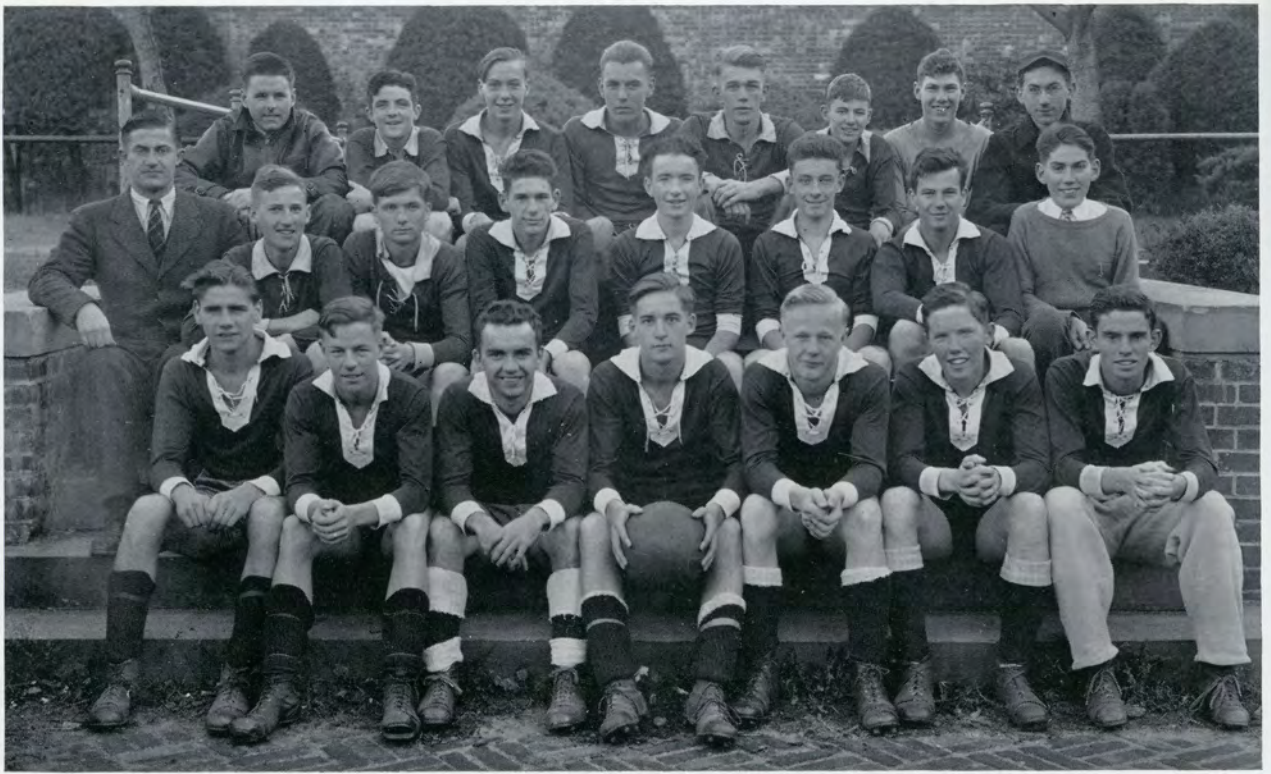

SPORT BRIEFS OF YESTERDAY AND TODAY

Sports in Manchester High School a quarter of a century ago were not so fully developed as the present activities of our school are today. In 1915, Manchester High had soccer, basketball, track, and baseball teams. Today, in addition to these sports we have football, swimming, cross-country, golf, and tennis teams.

In the course of twenty-five years, many fine records in sports have been established. The record for the high jump set in 1904 by John Pickles was 5 feet $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches, while today the record held by Wesley Palmer of the class of 1938 is 6 feet $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches. The present discus record of 138 feet $\frac{1}{4}$ inch, set by Elmo Gavello, as compared with 76 feet 5 inches set in 1908 by J. Horan, shows a marked increase in the skill of this sport.

The following quotations found in past issues of the *Somanhis* concerning sports may prove to be interesting as well as enlightening.

"After a lapse of over thirty years, football as a major sport was renewed in South Manchester High School. On September 13, 1923, Principal Quimby announced that a team to play this sport would be organized on the condition that members of the team or the student body finance the outfitting of such a team."

"Since the time when a player was injured while playing football with the High School in the late 90's, the sport was not recognized in this institution."

Have you ever heard of the "Manchester Independents?" An unusual experience brought about its organization. The basketball team of 1915-1916 planned a game with Windham High School. At this time the boys traveled by train to their games and it happened that the trains were considerably off schedule on the trip to Willimantic. Three Manchester players had made the trip by automobile and were prepared to play the game. Unfortunately, the remainder of the Manchester team failed to reach Willimantic, so the three Manchester boys borrowed two players from Windham and defeated Windham High under the name of the "Manchester Independents"!

The M. H. S. athletic teams may be proud of their many victories. In 1928 the M. H. S. football team showed its worth by defeating West Hartford 26-6 thus capturing the C. C. I. L. football championship. The football team again succeeded in capturing the championship in 1938.

The achievements of the years 1931-32 proved worth remembering because Manchester not only held the C. C. I. L. title for basketball, but swimming as well, and placed second in the state track meet.

Again in 1938 Manchester High School was victorious in capturing the Connecticut State basketball championship and the New England basketball championship.

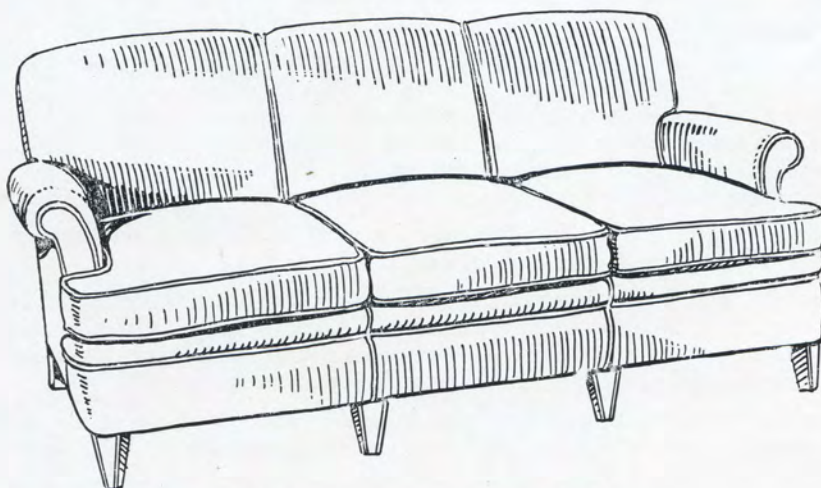
The high school baseball teams have won three C. C. I. L. championships. In 1938 the baseball team was entered in the semi-finals and in 1938 the quarter-finals of the state tournaments.

Since 1936 intramural basketball, softball, and baseball have become very popular with the students.

That Manchester High School has been outstanding in the field of sports can be seen by these records. A recent survey of the athletic record of the school showed that 28% of the boys play in intramural sports and 35% take part in inter-school sports. Of the girls, 17% play within school and 9% participated in play days with other schools.

Sports have always played an important part in the physical development of M. H. S. students. Sports are one of the chief interests and sources of recreation provided by the school together with the various cultural clubs.
