Jane." The last two plays were directed by students.

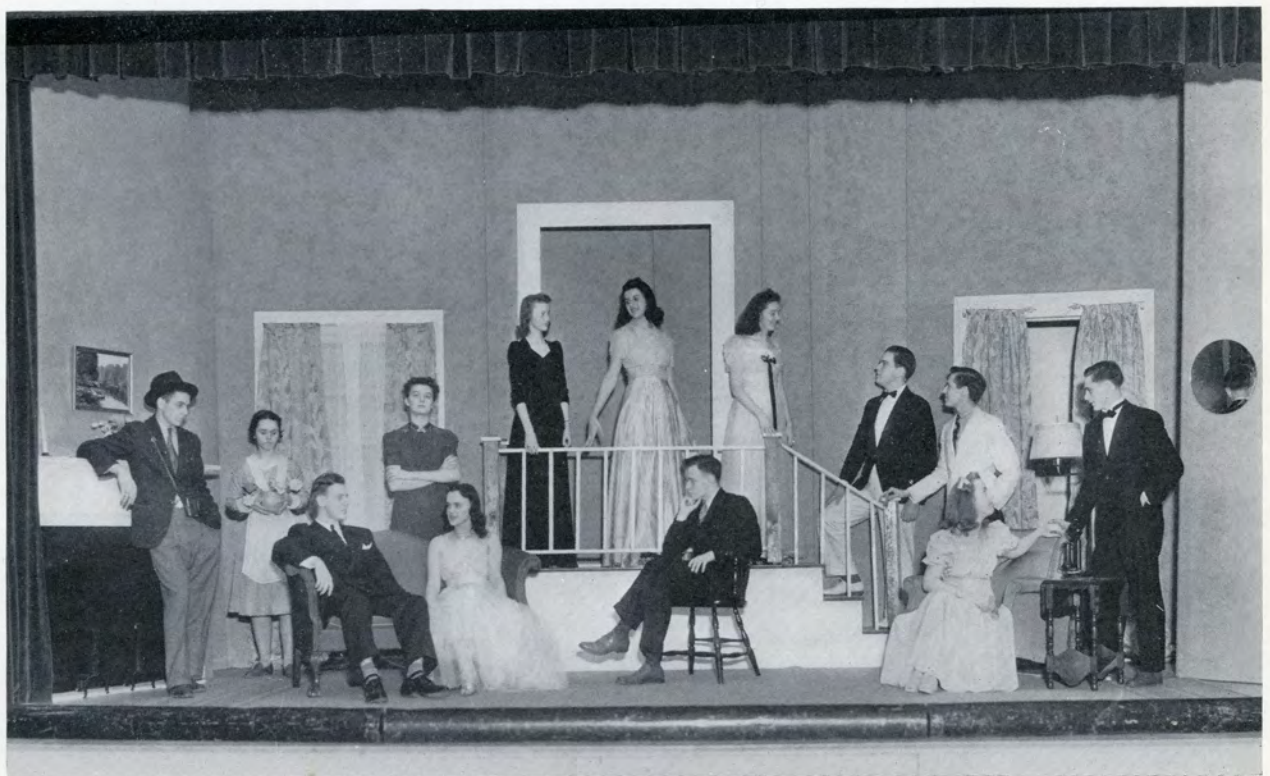

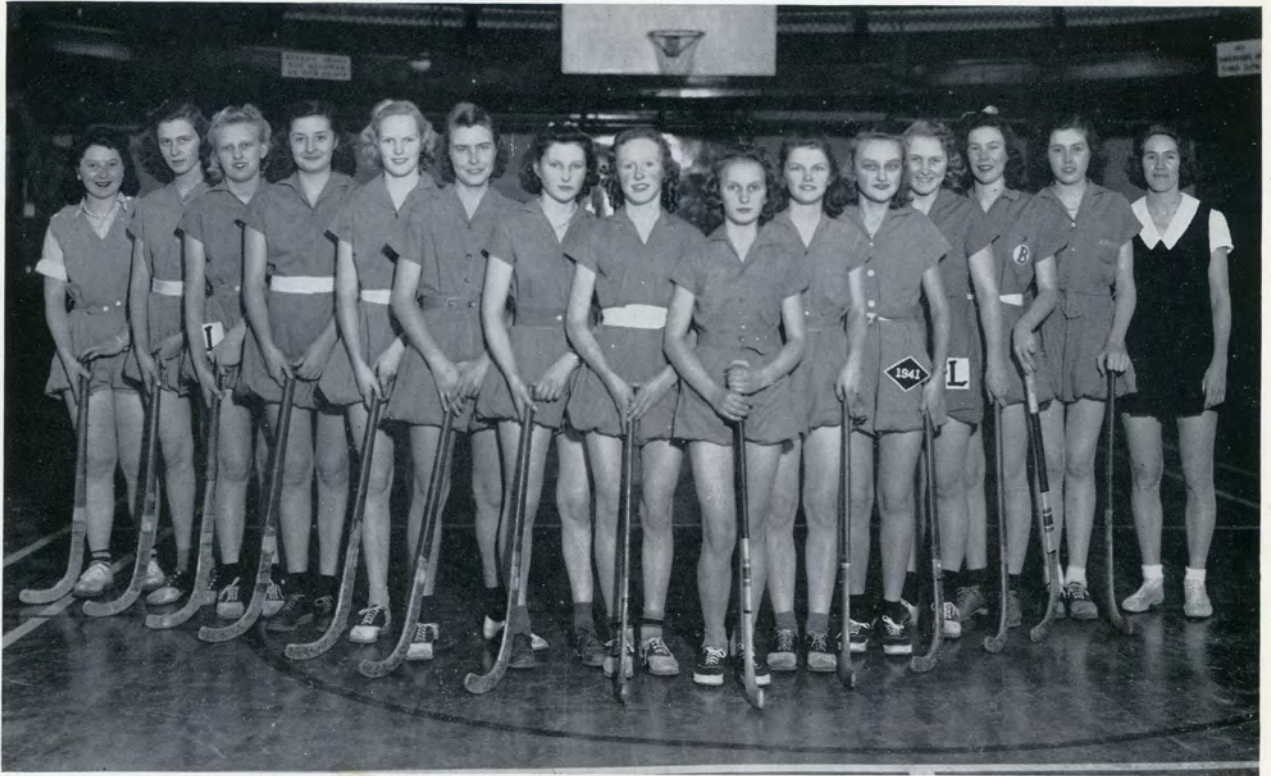
## Leaders Class . . . . .

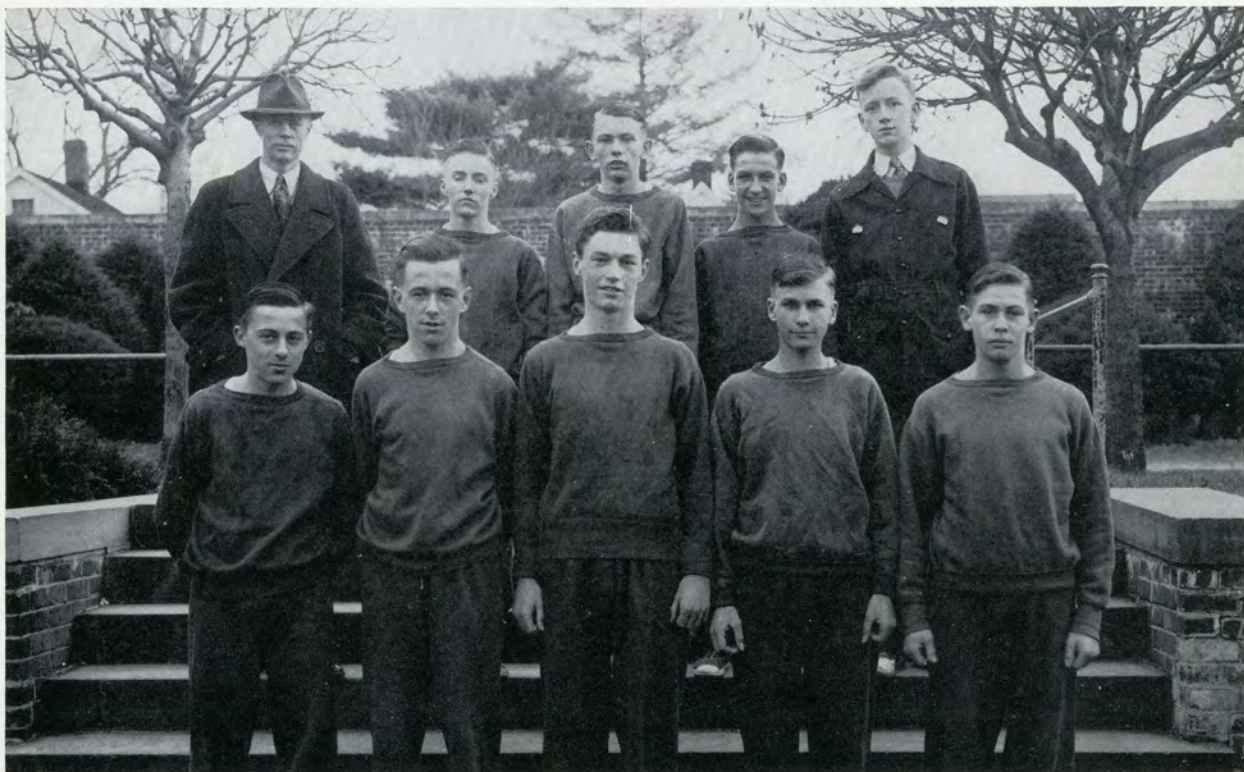

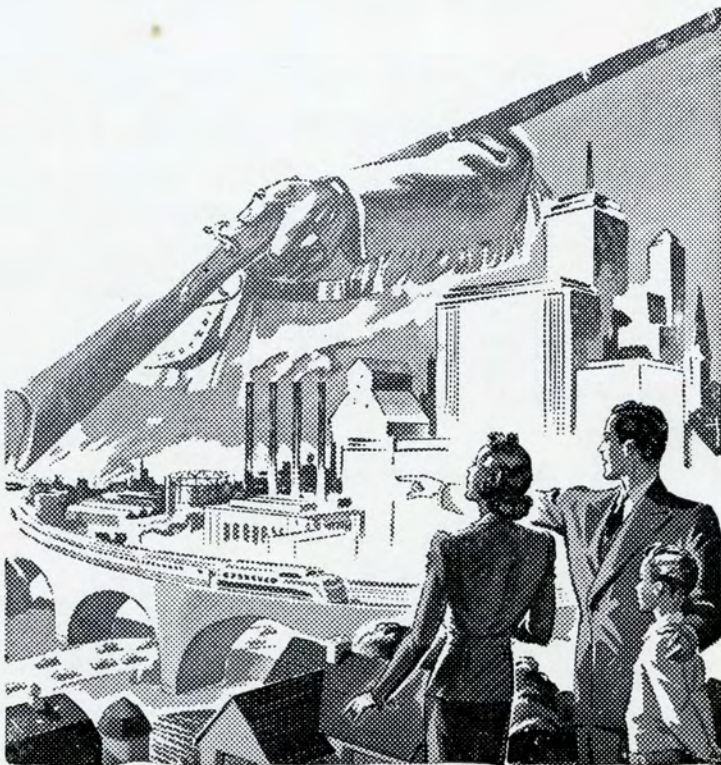
