The activities of the year were brought to a close with the annual initiatory dance held at the Country Club.





Under the direction of Miss Marion Casey, faculty adviser, the Quill Club was formed to encourage creative writing.


During meetings held every second Friday activity period, original essays, stories, and editorials were read and

At Christmas time a poster, painted by Betty Mae Nichols, with a poem written by Beatrice Kristoff, was sent to each home room.



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


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

played between rooms. The four highest teams played in a final tournament to decide the championship. This sport has proved so successful that it will be continued next year.

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
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
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
