Current Affairs Club





Music Organizations






Debating Club

Cheerleading






The Manchester High Football Team, one of the finest ever to wear the colors for old Alma Mater, enjoyed one of the few undefeated seasons in its history.




The basketball team had a fairly successful year by edging out Bristol for second place in the C.C.I.L. race. Meriden took top honors.
