

Rosalie Goodman (1848-1925) was one of three children of Electa W. Cheney Goodman (1821-1903) and Richard Goodman (1818-1896) of Massachusetts. Electa and the artist Seth Wells (1810-1856) were siblings, in the generation of Cheney brothers who founded the famous silk mills in Manchester, CT.
