When this column makes its usual Thursday appearance in tomorrow's Herald, it will have a new author, Mrs. Vivian F. Ferguson, 78 Forest St.

In the nine years it has been a feature in The Herald, the column has supplied its readers with keys to new adventures in eating, found in the kitchens of Manchester-area homemakers.

There have been two previous authors of the column. Marge Flynn was the first when the column appeared initially on Nov. 4, 1959; and Doris Belding, now Mrs. Rudolph Gorsch, whose closing recipe by her mother, Mrs. Charles Hastings, was in last Thursday's Herald.

Mrs. Ferguson is the wife of The Herald co-publisher, Thomas F. Ferguson, and is the mother of two daughters and a son. She has been active in many town civic affairs, and now is chairman of the Gift Shop at Manchester Memorial Hospital run by its Women's Auxiliary.

If you have a recipe you would like to share, Mrs. Ferguson invites you to send it to her at The Herald. It should include your name, address, and telephone number. Not all can be accepted, and none can be returned.

"We shall be looking for male chefs, teen-agers, and husband-wife teams," she said. "It doesn't have to be a complicated dish.

"Maybe you have included canned or frozen foods. What do you do with left-overs? Perhaps you have an exceptional punch or drink recipe. Do you make certain dishes for holidays, or for other special occasions?"

"With current emphasis on weight-watching, dietetic recipes should be of interest. We very much want family recipes that one does not ordinarily find in a cookbook, or a recipe you have changed to suit your own taste.

"Please share your recipes with your neighbors," Mrs. Ferguson said.
